LAW AND ORDER LEAGUE.
Constitution and By-Laws of The County Organization.

ARTICLE I.
Name.
The name of this organization shall be the Law and Order League for Sherman county.

ARTICLE II.
Object.
The object of this organization shall be to co-operate with the county officials of Sherman county, Oregon, and all other officers in the enforcement of law; particularly as to the enforcement of the Local Option Law. And to assist such officers therein and to see to it that such laws are vigorously enforced.

ARTICLE III.
Membership.
Any person may become a member of the organization whose purpose and aims are in accordance with the objects stated, who pays the membership dues and who shall further subscribe to the following pledge: I hereby pledge myself to promote the interests of this League and to seek to obtain evidence of violations of law and to divulge the same to the executive committee. Failure to do so forfeits my membership in the League.

ARTICLE IV.
Fees and Dues.
Each member, on joining the League shall pay a membership fee of \$1.00, and thereafter quarterly fee of twenty-five cents.

ARTICLE V.
Officers and Duties.
The officers of the League shall consist of a President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, and Executive Committee.

ARTICLE VI.
Meetings.
There shall be at least two meetings of the League each year; at which time the officers shall make report as to progress of the League and work done, including a financial report.

ARTICLE VII.
Quorum.
A majority of the Executive Committee shall be considered a quorum for transaction of the business of the League.

ARTICLE VIII.
Amendments.
These By Laws may be amended, or added to, at any regular meeting of the League, or at a special meeting, due notice of such amendment having been given through the press of this county, including time and place; such amendment requiring the approval of a majority of the Executive Committee, and two-thirds vote of all members present.
