A young lady, 18 years old, located on Bedloe Island New York Harbor is to be painted inside and out so goes the story. It is to be done to insure her a long life of future usefulness and the job will be paid for by the United States government, costing \$62,800. Don't be alarmed, it's the statue of liberty given to the United States by the French government eighteen years ago.

William J. Clarke, the well-known newspaper man of Gervais, aspirant in the republican primary for state printer, has been honored with the office of Grand Master Workman of the Ancient Order of United Workmen. Mr. Clark will give the order a live and capable business administration, and it goes without saying that his friends here are pleased at this recognition of his abilities.

General Stoesel, who for so many months defended Fort Arthur against attacks of the Japanese, will be sentenced to death for surrendering the fortress. The report of the Russian court martial finds that resistance could have been prolonged a considerable length of time and holds that it was the garrison's duty to hold out until the last man perished, in accordance with Russian army ideals, before striking colors. The court martial officers don't figure on the Japs while "holding out."

The latest move in Russia comes as a surprise. Rumor has not been wanting that the dissolution of the Douma was contemplated but there was doubt if this would actually be attempted. Autocracy, however, has taken the bit in its teeth; has set its life upon the cast, and it must stand the hazard of the die. Events in Russia are following, with singular analogy, events that made up the record of the French Revolution. Absolutism of later time appears not to have learned anything from the earlier time. There is the same inconceivable manifestation of the same obstinacy in the one case that there was in the other and the fact is significant, apparent that in all essentials the Russian situation is developing along the same lines similar to those of the French cataclysm.

It has been suggested by some of the Sherman county merchants that if a cash system be inaugurated it would be a help to all in business as well as substantial benefit to all who want to pay as they go; it would also lead to less wasteful buying and all would be in better condition to stand years like the present. It is suggested that a graded system of cash discounts be established. That is, a man paying cash is entitled to a certain discount, now frequently given. The man who pays 30 days gets a certain discount also, although not so much as the cash customer; the 60 day man and the 90-day man, get their discounts also, but they are smaller in proportion to the varying length of time the merchant has to wait for his money. The scheme appears to be all the more feasible because of its reasonableness and justice.
