Trick With Matches.

In a plate or basin filled with water place eight matches in the form of a star, taking care that only the lower part of each match shall become wet, and next prepare a magician's wand in such a manner that it will resemble a short ebony staff with two ivory tips. A suitable ebony staff can be made by putting a coat of black varnish on a small tin tube, and as substitute for the ivory tips a small cylindrical piece of soap and another of sugar must be used. Soaking these white objects at the two ends of the staff, the audience can readily be made to believe that they are ivory tips.

If you want the matches to come together all that is necessary is to dip the sugar tipped end of the wand in the water about the center of the star, for the sugar will at once begin to draw the water into its pores and naturally the matches will crowd together in the same direction. On the other hand, if you want the matches to move away from each other all that is necessary is to dip the soap tipped end of the wand in the water, for the soap will at once begin to draw the water away from the matches, and the matches will move away from each other.

Paper Cutting.
One of the best kinds of busy work for little folks is paper cutting. All that is required for this work are a few sheets of colored paper and a pair of scissors for each cutter. First fold the paper several times, then cut it in a number of places, and then cut it in a number of places. When the paper is unfolded the result will be a design that will delight the children and which they will wish to imitate. Having fairly started the little people in this work, the question of amusement will be too busy trying to copy your pattern to think of anything else. Later on when they have become better acquainted with the work they will perhaps want to attempt something original in the way of design.

Game of Weathercocks.

The "wind" stands in the center of the room, the other players, "weathercocks," in rows. The four corners of the room are north, south, east and west. When the wind points to one corner, calling out its name, the weathercocks must immediately turn in the opposite direction. If the wind cries "West" and points in that direction, the weathercocks must face east. Whenever the wind shouts "Tempest!" all must turn around three times, returning to the exact position they occupied before the wind was spoken. When the wind cries "Variable!" the weathercocks must swing back and forth on their toes until the name of one of the cardinal points is added. If it is south, for instance, they must turn directly to the north. When the wind names a point which the weathercocks are already facing they do not move. Any one making a mistake in any of these things must pay a forfeit!

STRAIGHT TIPS.

Care of Men's Clothes Saves Tailor's Services.

Caring for men's clothes is something almost every woman has to do some time in her life, for not always is the expense of a tailor's services so small. It is a difficult task simply because they do not understand just how to press trousers that bag at the knees or how to remove the sheen from coats that have perhaps outlived their usefulness or eradicate the spots that destroy the appearance of an otherwise neat looking suit.

"Pressing trousers is really exceedingly simple," declares a woman whose husband's clothes always look as if they were cared for by an expert tailor. "If they are pressed after the second or third wearing the knees will not only never bag, but the creases at the front and back will always look fresh. The actual pressing is very easy. The seams at the sides of the trousers should be carefully matched before the trousers are laid on the ironing board. This done, a damp cloth should be placed over the material and a hot iron used to press out the lines. The steaming caused by the wet cloth and the heat from the iron shrinks the stretched portions into shape, removing the bagginess. After this is done hang them to dry thoroughly before being worn."

"Grease spots should, of course, be removed with gasoline, naphtha or some cleaning fluid and the material well brushed and aired before being pressed or the dirt will be ironed into the cloth and the entire labor lost."

Press Garments Often.

"Coats and vests need pressing about once a week if worn frequently, but I should never suggest doing this at home, for to properly iron shoulders, backs and fronts of these garments boards regularly shaped, such as tailors have, are necessary, and without them the work is bound to look botched. So it is much better to send them to a tailor, for all turn pieces in either coats or trousers can often be mended so



that they will not show, while if attempted at home by one who is not familiar with such work the suit will be practically ruined.

"When not in use coats and vests should always be placed on hangers to keep the shoulders in shape and the neck of the former from sagging, as it is bound to do if hung from a tape at the top. Trousers, too, should be placed on hangers with the bottoms up to keep the legs correctly in shape and to preserve the creases in them."

"Taking the shine from clothes is not difficult to accomplish if a damp cloth is placed over a very hot iron and the latter held close to the material, though not placed directly upon it. Or a sponge with diluted ammonia and water and a careful rubbing afterward will often have the desired effect on clothes that have become worn and shiny from use."

"At least once a week all suits should be hung in the sun inside out if they are of a color that is likely to fade, and the dust pounded out of them with a light rattan stick. The pockets at such times should also be turned out and brushed, for they collect dust that will gather in great rolls and annoy the wearer if not removed. Suits of linen or crash are treated just like any other wash garment."
