The new law regulating the sale and dispensing of poisonous drugs, goods and solutions of all kinds goes into effect tomorrow, when your grocer, seedman, etc., who have been dispensing arsenic, strychnine, and other poisonous compounds, as rat, squirrel and bug exterminators, will be put entirely out of that part of the business which is hereafter open in Oregon exclusively to the registered pharmacist.

At last, after four years experimenting in an impractical way by previous owners, the McCoy-Barnum building Main and First street has a roof. The first one put on carried a ships load of shingle ballast, tied in place with tar. That made the ceilings under the roof resemble the swells of an ocean, and produced sea sickness when a tenant looked upon it. Silver dollars; and \$5 gold pieces, so cleverly counterfeited as to almost defy detection, are abundant in the Inland Empire, and are no doubt the product of an Eastern Oregon gang, whom detectives are in pursuit of. The dollars easily pass the inspection of the average critical bank clerk, the only exception from the genuine being that the coin weighs slightly more than the good dollar, but does not contain a ounce of silver, its mineral parts consisting of aluminum, tin and lead. The \$5 piece is slightly off color, is made from copper and brass, and washed in gold. Its date is 1903. One bank in Eastern Oregon was visited that had \$780 of the worthless stuff on deposit.

"In the midst of life we are in death." While awaiting his sad mission to Moro, to convey the remains of his father here for burial, the wife of West Harris died of neuralgia of the heart. Deceased was formerly Miss Nellie Williams of 8-Mile. She leaves four children.

United States District Attorney Bristol's description of the counterfeit silver dollar is misleading. The M at the base of the head is upon fully 99 percent of all genuine silver dollars circulating in this part of Eastern Oregon. J L C is indeed rare.

Masonic Hall in this city, which is the general rendezvous for all the goat buccaros, has been so elegantly renovated that even the Rebekas will be proud tonight. Axtell jr, and Axtell sr, are the artists, and Landford LaDru Barnum puts up the coin for it, without raising the rent.

Commenting on the conflicting reports sent out by the climatological service of the United States Department of Agriculture from Portland, the Dalles Chronicle says Mr Brooks of this city who has kept track of the comings and goings of the Columbia river for over 30 years, predicts a stage between 35 and 40 feet perhaps not that high. Last year it reached 23.4, and the average date of the highest stage is about June 1st. Today, May 21, it is 28.6 feet. Mr Brooks bases his predictions on two reasons. 1st, While there was much snow in the mountains in December and January, there was also a warm spell which melted it, and later it congealed. This will melt gradually, and cause no great flow of water. 2d, The immense canals along Snake river take so much water that the flood from that source is not nearly so great as in former years.
