There is nothing finished looking about the place except the visitors as they make their exit. The whole place bears an aspect of 'toosoonness.' In 1845 they were grinding flour at \$40 per bbl. In its reminiscences Judge Nichols tells of a forlorn immigrant who drove up to the mill one day and bought \$200 worth on credit. He couldn't refuse it, and after taking his cussing from Nez, who was book keeper, and had to charge the transaction, incurred further wrath when he had forgotten to ask the man what was his name. But the forlorn immigrant paid the bill the next year, and afterwards became known as one of the foremost enterprising citizens of this great state.
