You can kill currant and gooseberry worms by using hellebore, dissolved in water, the bushes being sprayed with it. Take a tablespoonful of hellebore, add a quart of hot water, and allow it to stand a few hours, then add to it a half of water, and spray the bushes well. An old broom will answer very well for spraying. The worms are soon killed, and the poison will not last long. In a few days the berries may be eaten.
