Coroners' Inquest.

In the matter of the death of John Freeman. Verdict of coroners jury:

We, the following jury empanelled by W I Westerfield, Justice of the Peace for District No. 4, Grass Valley, Sherman county, Oregon, to inquire into the death of John Freeman, find that the name of deceased is John Freeman; that he came to his death in McDonald, Or on the evening of July 2, 1907, between the hours of 8 and 9 p m, as the result of a gunshot wound, the kind of gun from which the shot was fired being unknown to this jury. We further find that one W G McDonald was assaulted on the head with a spade, by one R S Ward, who was with said deceased; that soon thereafter said W G McDonald fired two or three shots from a 32-Caliber revolver, to frighten said assailant. We further find that said W G McDonald was in a dazed condition when he fired those shots, from the effects of the wound inflicted on his head by the said R S Ward and that if any of said shots caused the death of deceased, the same was done accidentally and unintentionally, while in said dazed condition, and we find him not responsible, and excuse him for the same.

Gov Chamberlain made no error in his selection of a member of the state normal school board when he appointed Henry J Maier of The Dalles one of the six who are to take all state normal schools out of the graft column, and if possible advance these schools as bona fide educational institutions, not to be juggled with by political tricksters in the assembly. Mr Maier has had several years experience as director in the schools of Dalles city, and is one of the most popular business men and upright citizens of that enterprising city.

Colonist rates in effect Sept 1st, continue until October 31st. This is the rate that brings the actual settler to Oregon, and means that people can come here from Kansas city, St Paul, Minneapolis, and all the great territory between the Missouri river and the Rocky mountains, for \$25; to all points east of Umatilla, \$22.50. From St Louis \$30, from Chicago \$33. The most important thing about this to remember is that these people must buy their tickets direct to the towns they want to reach. This is true with regard to Moro, The Dalles, Eugene city, Astoria, and any other city or town in the state. Many get the impression that they can go thru to Portland, and then continue their trip to point of destination, and it devolves upon each and every community to correct this erroneous impression.

The long delayed reduced rates to the east on account of the Jamestown exposition have been decided upon. Tickets on sale August 8, 9, 10 and Sept. 11, 12, 13. The round trip rate to Chicago will be \$71.50; Omaha, Kansas city and St Paul \$80; St Louis \$67.50, with an additional \$13.50 should the passenger desire to return via California. Tickets will have a ten-day limit going, and a final return limit of 90 days from date of sale.
