An Important Discovery.

DW Kempf, a well known miner of Susanville called this morning with a sample of a new mineral substance which he is using to weld steel in his shop for more than a year past, and pronounces it better than borax, or any other material he has ever used. It does not produce scales, as does borax. It is of a grayish color and is also valuable for polishing purposes. It is found covering an area of about three acres, and all that is necessary is to scoop it up and sack it for shipment. Cost, 10 c. Baker city, would not exceed 8c. per lb., borax is 20c. per lb.

A Tree of Antiquity.

Spokesman-Review.

While excavating at the Moscow city waterworks for a new plant recently, workmen encountered a stump at a depth of 34 below the surface, three feet high, 12 inches in diameter, and in a good state of preservation. Chips off the tree were found all around it. The tree is filled with ore, iron and copper predominant. Pieces of the roots, when taken in the hand give a sense of weight quite like a sample of quartz. Men of a scientific bent of mind are speculating as to how many years ago this part of Latah county was filled in to this depth, and by what forces; and what variety the trees were.

Wheat Worms' Summer Resort.

Mt. Rainier Report.

In their ascent of Mount Rainier Prof. John B Flett of Tacoma, and Prof. Cowles, and a scientific party from Chicago, discovered in the ice of Urania glacier, billions of very small worms. The discovery astounded the scientists, who could hardly believe their eyes until they had cut into the hard ice and removed some of the worms for microscopic examination. The worms were about an inch in length and the size of a hair and presented a wiggling, squirming mass in the solid ice. In places the ice was black with them.

Colonist rates in effect Sept. 1st, continue until October 31st. This is the rate that brings the actual settler to Oregon, and means that people can come here from Kansas city St Paul, Minneapolis, and all the great territory between the Missouri river and the Rocky mountains, for \$25; to all points east of Umatilla, \$22.50. From St Louis \$30, from Chicago \$33. The most important thing about this to remember is that these people must buy their tickets direct to the towns they want to reach. This is true with regard to Moro, The Dalles, Eugene city, Astoria, and any other city or town in the state. Many get the impression that they can go thru to Portland, and then continue their trip to point of destination; and it devolves upon each and every community to correct this erroneous impression.
