Grand Jury Report.

Following is the complete report of the Grand Jury made to the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon, for Sherman county, Hon E V Littlefield, Judge, in session last week:

We the Grand Jury heretofore duly empaneled beg leave to submit the following report. We were empaneled and sworn on the 7th day of October, 1907, and have been in session three days, during which time we have caused to be sworn and examined before us witnesses. We have made to the court three reports, finding two true bills and one not a true bill, and have examined into four matters upon which we did not deem it necessary to make any report, finding no cause for action. We have investigated fully all reports coming to us concerning any violation of the Local Option Law, having examined 24 witnesses from various parts of the county relative to this matter, and have been unable to find evidence sufficient to warrant an indictment.

We have visited the offices of the sheriff, clerk, treasurer and assessor and while we were not able to make any extended examinations, owing to lack of time, we find these several offices conducted, so far as we have been able to see, in a careful and business-like manner, and therefore have no criticisms to make concerning the conduct of any of said officers.

We have examined the public buildings of the county, and the grounds upon which they are located, and find some improvements necessary, to wit: We would recommend first some suitable heating plant to be installed at the Court house, for the purpose of furnishing heat to the several offices, court rooms and jail, as we believe this would greatly lessen the danger of fire, and diminish the expense of heating the building.

We would further recommend that the County court take steps to install a water system of its own, somewhere on its grounds, for the purpose of providing an ample supply of water for use within the building, and for the purpose of maintaining a lawn, and beautifying the grounds around the Court house, and as a means of protection in case of fire, as we deem the present supply wholly inadequate for any of the purposes above named.

Having completed our duties, and filed this a full report of our doings, we would respectfully ask that the Grand Jury be now discharged. Respectfully submitted.
