It is said that the growth of the educational movement in China has been so great that the demand for instructors has far exceeded the supply of "competent men."

During one month of terrorism in turbulent Russia, 34 persons were executed and 207 murdered. Yet, in peaceful Massachusetts, with a population 1.5th that of Russia, during three months from June 21 to Sept. 21, 41 persons were killed by automobiles and 313 injured.

Some of the railroads, when brot to bar for rebating under the Elkins act, plead that the indictment was found under a law that had been repealed by the passage of the Hepburn, or Rate law, and that therefore they should go unpunished. They mistake the Rate law for a general act of amnesty.

In spite of complications in the stock market, "frenzied finance" is offered \$150,000,000 "securities" by the Canadian-American syndicate, now working with Brazilian railways, and other enterprises now undertaken or projected.

Pierpont Morgan was correct perhaps, in saying that "people were foolish to fly into a panic and withdraw their money from the banks as soon as there was indication of a financial flurry;" but such is the nature of the majority of humanity, and closest observation for 50 years fails to show us that advice gratis and free lectures will change it.

In striking contrast to the pessimism which pervades the country, was the optimism characterizing a speech delivered by James J. Hill a few days ago before the St. Paul Jobbers' and Manufacturers' association.

According to Edward H. Harriman, J. Pierpont Morgan, Secretary Cortelyou, Rockefeller, and a lot of other fellows, the present season of liquidation is a wholesome cleaning up.

The question whether Secretary Taft should not visit Paris and London, as well as St. Petersburg and Berlin, on his journey home, ought to be considered.
