A citizen, in order to register, must have lived in the state six months and in the precinct 30 days. Every voter must register anew this year. The primary elections will be held April 17.

Taxes will become delinquent the first Monday in April. If the full amount is paid on or before March 15 a rebate of three per cent will be allowed. If one-half of the above taxes is paid on or before the first Monday in April, the time for the remaining half will be extended to the first Monday in October; if not so paid and becomes delinquent a penalty of 10 per cent and 12 per cent interest will be added.
