If you don't register you cannot sign nominating petitions and you cannot vote in the primaries. If you don't register you will not receive from the secretary of state, by mail, copies of the initiative measures to be voted on in June.

The registration books are open from 8 to 5 o'clock every day, at the court house. The books will close for the primaries at 5 o'clock April 7. A citizen, in order to register, must have lived in the state six months and in the precinct 30 days. Every voter must register anew this year. The primary elections will be held April 17.

Taxes will become delinquent the first Monday in April. If the full amount is paid on or before March 15 a rebate of three per cent will be allowed. If one-half of the above taxes is paid on or before the first Monday in April, the time for the remaining half will be extended to the first Monday in October; if not so paid and become delinquent a penalty of 10 per cent and 12 per cent interest will be added.

IN MEMORIAM.

Sherman county has lost another good citizen, one of our prominent men. Hon Bruno F Medler was born in Germany, October 2d, 1839. Died at his family home near Wasco, Sherman county, Monday evening, at 9 o'clock, March 9th, 1908, of heart trouble, buried on the Wednesday following at 11 a m.

Bruno Medler's father was an expert manufacturing jeweler in the old country, and when the family moved to the United States in 1847 locating in New York city, followed the same occupation, and Bruno was apprenticed to that vocation, but owing to ill health left it for farming operations in West Virginia in 1857. Leaving there in 1876 he located near Walla Walla. Leaving there in 1880 he located near Wasco; where, in 1881, he harvested his own crop of 60 acres of wheat, and the first header and thrasher used in what is now Sherman county.

Deceased was one of the county commissioners of Wasco county one term before Sherman was set off from Wasco. His business was a partnership in the drug store firm of Marsh & Medler.




