PRESBYTERY OF PENDLETON.

The Presbytery of Pendleton, which covers the territory extending from Dalles city to Kamela and to the southern border of the state from the line of the Columbia, met in Moro, April 23-26.

It was a delightful session of the Presbytery, with 10 of the ministers in the district, and four lay members present.

This being the third year since the creation of this new Presbytery, the officers and committeemen were changed. Rev B F Harper of Milton was elected moderator for the coming year; Rev Harper was also elected stated clerk of the Presbytery for the term of three years. An important change in the committee was that of the chairmanship of the home mission committee, which fell to Rev J M Cornelson, the missionary to the Indians on the Umatilla reservation, formerly stated clerk.

This committee is considered the most important in the Presbytery since this is strictly a home mission Presbytery, and this committee has the disbursing of the home mission funds.

Rev A J Adams of Moro was elected permanent clerk of the Presbytery for the next three years. The brethren pronounce the Moro meeting as very successful, and of fine spirit. The fall meeting will be held in Portland, just preceding the meeting of Synod, October 16.

Three men were dismissed to other Presbyteries.

The reports from each church and field were encouraging and growth noted in all. In the two Pendleton churches, and in the Indian church (Tutuilla), remarkable revivals were reported.

There will be a field or two vacant for a while till suitable men can be secured for them. The whole outlook is one of hope and progress all over the Presbytery. Two petitions were presented to Presbytery for the organization of new churches, in the southern part of Umatilla county, at Pilot Rock and Ukiah.

The committee on resolutions presented the following, which was unanimously adopted—

In that we have had such a successful and delightful meeting of Presbytery at Moro, and in that our stay with the Moro people has been made so pleasant by all, we hereby express our heartfelt thanks to the pastor, session and people of Moro church.

We thank the ladies who have so delightfully and hospitably entertained us in their homes. We also thank the IOOF, No. 113, for their invitation to be with them at their hall dedication and basket dinner; and we desire that these resolutions be printed in The Observer.

FARMING DEMONSTRATIONS

Train Will Reach Moro Monday May 11th at 11.30 a m. for one Hour.

Two special farming demonstration trains will be operated over the Oregon and Washington lines of the O R & N during the month of May. The Oregon train will be Sherman, Gilliam, Morrow, and Umatilla counties, May 11, 12, 13 and 14. Among the subjects to be discussed by the O A C professors who accompany the train, are live stock, fruit growing, chemistry of the soil, rotation of crops, conservation of moisture, general culture methods, etc. Stops will be made at Sherman county stations May 11 for one hour lectures, as follows, at Kent ar 8 30 a m—lv 9 30 Gr Valley . . . ar 10 00 a m—lv 11 00 Moro, lunch, ar 11 30 a m—lv 1 30 Wasco ar 2 30 p m—lv 3 30 Professors Withycombe, C I Lewis, C E Bradley and H D Scudder, of the Oregon Agricultural College will be on the train, as will also R B Miller and Byron Hunter.

Secretary Wilson of the department of agriculture has taken special interest in the work started by Mr Miller and will send a representative of the department to accompany the trains.

Mr Miller shows that the purpose of the O R & N Co, in sending out these trains is to grow profitable crops on about 1,000,000 acres of land tributary to the railway lines of the Inland Empire which, under the present method of summer fallow, lie idle each year. The conservation of moisture and the replenishing of the soil with organic matter, which will assist in maturing larger wheat crops than are now grown, is another object in view, as well as the establishment of such physical conditions as will prevent the exhaustion of the land in future years. The plan contemplates the increase of population and the addition to the wealth of the country by cutting up large individual holdings of land into smaller tracts. These things will provide a means towards lessening the disastrous effects which a failure of the wheat crop will bring about. The wheat farms of the Inland Empire are already large, and the tendency is to further enlarge them. The result is that the population in the country districts is not increasing as it should, particularly in Sherman county, where we are handicapped by such holdings as those of the Eastern Oregon Land Company. These conditions can be overcome through continuous occupation of the soil by a rotating system of cropping and abandonment of the alternating summer fallow in districts where the precipitation is sufficiently great to make the latter unnecessary. The lectures to be given will vary according to the needs of the different sections.

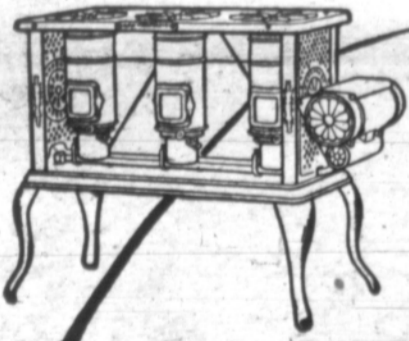
