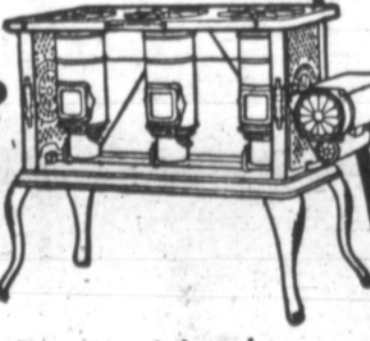
Grants station, in this county, in future will be a flag stop for train No 3. The authority is given in Supl. Campbell's bulletin No. 205, March 25th.

The Memorial Service held in Moro M. E. Church Sunday last, under the auspices of W. T. Sherman Post, G. A. R., was a season of profit to all who were present.

Red, White and Blue, America, The Battle Hymn of the Republic; and other National songs by the choir, caused both old and young to rejoice that we were alive, and living beneath the protection of The Flag.

Adjutant Meader read the orders of the day; followed by President Lincoln's address at Gettysburg, by J. M. Parry. Then followed the Memorial Sermon, by Rev. Perry Chandler. This address was from one who had been there; it was not from hearsay, but from facts, as seen on the field of battle he had touched, shoulder to shoulder; had seen the dead and dying, and war, in both its glory and horror. But there was no word of doubt in the sermon as to our future as a nation, with a full reliance on God as our guide. In his closing remarks: "What of the Future?" the writer felt as though he had come in contact with an electric battery, passing in review the history of the the Anglo Saxon race for the past 2000 years, always fighting for the right as he saw it, always for Liberty, and each conflict brought him nearer to the goal; that the three years of struggle during our civil war was only a part of that same combat, and that we are still the same militant race, always ready to fight for the right as we see it.
