Lippincott's Magazine. In the last days of the republic there was no family which was more distinguished than the Aker family.

In the first decade of the twentieth century, hardly a paper or magazine had but some reference to one or the other of them.

The most distinguished of them were Muek R. Aker, Nature F. Aker and Rebate T. Aker. It is not clear now what the relationship of these three was, although it is known they were closely connected.

Many of the best authorities believe them to have been brothers, but it is hardly likely that three men of such diverse characters could have been the sons of one father.

It seems more likely that Rebate T. Aker was the son, or possible, the brother of one For Aker, who was United States senator from one of the principal commonwealths at that time.

There are some genealogists who believe they have traced the family back as far as the first American revolution, and who aver that they were all descended from a famous religious man who was called Q. U. Aker, who came to this country and settled first in Pennsylvania, but this aversment is substantiated on philological grounds only.

Rebate T. Aker was immensely wealthy, and history tells of a bitter feud between him and his followers, and the followers of one Trust B. E. Aker, a distant cousin.

Both Nature F. Aker and Muek R. Aker were noted for their literary abilities and their vivid imaginations, although their work lay along different lines, the former devoting himself to the study of biology and animal life, the latter attending solely to political and social phenomena.
