WONDERFUL INLAND EMPIRE.

Cotton has been added to the productions of the Inland Empire. A Pasco editor made the discovery, and has actually grown a crop. The plants are about 30 inches high and the fluffy cotton is just bursting from the pods. That the crop may be made profitable is shown from estimates of people who have seen the Pasco field and know from experience acquired by work around cotton fields down South. These declare that the article in sight will net 400 pounds of raw cotton per acre after the seeds are extracted. Near this cotton field may be seen a field of sweet corn, a purely northern product attaining its full growth. Across the line in Idaho experiments have been made in tobacco growing, and that they have proved successful was shown at St. Louis, where some of the Idaho seed secured the gold prize. Some of the rarest specimens of exotic grapes from Southern Europe flourish in the Lewiston valley, which is another additional proof of the wonderful climatic conditions existing within the Inland Empire.

Hill, chairman of the board of directors of the Great Northern Ry, at the recent dedication of an agricultural hall at Crookston. Mr. Hill stated that with the present birth rate the country would not be able to take care of its own people, let alone the prospect of exporting grain to Europe, unless our farmers make deeper interest in the study of the science of agriculture, and learn how to raise more bushels to the acre than they are able to do at present. "I believe we have seen the last day in the history of this country, he continued, when wheat will be cheap hereafter. No. 1 hard wheat will bring the 90c which it is worth at the present time, and even more if the soil is properly cultivated." Mr. Hill declared further that the crops of the last few years have been steadily decreasing in the yield per acre, and with the many thousands of people who have come into this country to settle, most of the land has been taken up so the chance of accumulating greater acreage upon which to increase the size of the crops would soon be utterly impossible, even in Western Canada. The only solution of the problem according to Mr. Hill, is to study the question and ascertain in what way the output per acre can be increased.
