A pocket fire escape is on the market. It is certainly very ingenious and likely to prove of real benefit. It consists of a metallic tube 4-inch wide and 1-32d of an inch thick, running on a steel reel which is fastened to a web belt passing about the waist. The reel is provided with a brake, by means of which the person can control the descent. There is also an automatic brake to keep the required tension on the tape, and thus prevent a sudden drop. The end of the tape is provided with a thumb screw which can be fastened to the window sill or any object in the room. In appearance the machine is like a fisherman's reel and is about the size of a spool of thread. A public trial of it was recently made from the top of a high building in N Y City. The beginning of the experiment seemed perilous in the extreme. The inventor fixed the thumb screw, fastened the web-belt about his waist, and stepped off apparently into space from the 15th story. At first he descended slowly, then faster and faster, till it seemed as if he must have lost control over the little machine, the slender tape of which scarcely could be seen, and any time looked no larger than an ordinary cord. At the 4th story he stopped suddenly, and then descended again rapidly and slowly by turns, until he came to the scaffolding where there were several men working. There he took three men on the escape with him and thus dropped to the ground.

Postmasters of the country have been afforded an opportunity to do vast good by Postmaster Gen Myer's order directing them to confer with school officials with a view of giving short talks on postal matters in the public schools. Of all the institutions of the government the post office is closest to the people, and is most used by the people, yet there is a woeful lack of information among the people with respect to details of the service.

Tons and tons of small fish, edible products of the Columbia river, are caught at Sand Island, sardines that ought to be canned; tomcods, black cods and crabs that ought to be spiced and pickled; but it seems nothing is done about the matter except to catch the fish and set up a howl "no market!" That enormous waste would, if intelligently handled, feed the population of the entire Pacific northwest.

Robert S MacEwan, a pioneer of Clatsop county, distinctly recollects the great forest fire of 1825, which destroyed 4,000 lives at Miramichi, New Brunswick. The amount of property destroyed was enormous. Mr MacEwan was 12 years old, and lived with his parents within 100 yards of a river, into which the family jumped and saved their lives, but even then his clothing was burned off before he reached the water, and he still carries scars of the fire on his body. Bro. MacEwan related incidents of that terrible day to us 30 years ago, and new interest has been added to the history by recent publications by the forestry service.
