It provides that the homesteader may take up 320 acres instead of 160 acres as heretofore, of lands which cannot be successfully irrigated, and requires cultivation of it in a systematic way.

Announcement is made that in addition to the \$25 fare from Missouri river points; \$30.50 from St. Louis and \$33 from Chicago, a proportionate rate is good from every point in the United States, to this state. Say: From New York \$50; Boston \$49.75; Cleveland \$39.75; Birmingham \$40.25, etc.

Gen. Passenger Agent McMurray of the O. R. & N. Co., gives it as his opinion that the great increase in colonist travel so far this spring can be credited to the admirable system of community advertising done by the towns and cities of Oregon.
