W S Cooper, whose temporary home is in Polk county, was up last week looking after his farming interests, and selling a few horses, of which he was overstocked. He took his \$600 draft team to the valley with him.

Hon W H Moore, who was the Pioneer Father, and first mayor of this city, with a kindly feeling still prominent in his heart for the old town, made us a pleasant call on the 3d, en route to Hay canon, to inspect the Jack Thompson home place which he recently purchased in a deal.

Frequently we are reminded that Sherman county has some valuable up-land orchards. Last week we received two sacks; one from Geo Hennagin's orchard east of this city and one from John Johnson's south of town; which for good, clean, solid flavor and color, compare favorably with the best products of any highly puffed up fruit community, that we have yet seen or partaken of in this market.

Pure foods in Pennsylvania have taken an advance step upwards. The new law prohibits the traffic in "rots and spots," spoiled and cracked eggs; under penalty of a fine of from \$200 to \$1,000, or three to nine months in jail. Another Pennsylvania pure food law prohibits, under heavy penalty, the sale of an adulterated "soft drink," and will abolish the business in beverages made out of coal tar dyes and chemicals.

It has been a family secret since 1879, that Felix Gregorie buried an iron box on the farm, one of the quietest on French Prairie, in Marion county, containing \$3,000, but no number of the family could locate it. Last week a tramp came along looking for a job. He was set to work digging out an old peach tree stump back of the house. Having skipped out before noon unobserved, inspection of his work revealed the fact that he had picked up the long hidden treasure and got away with it.

A just complaint against the lack of adequate depot facilities at Rufus on the main line of the O R & N, in Sherman county, has sufficient foundation to warrant an investigation, and the railroad commission has fixed Tuesday, April 13th, at Rufus, as the date and place for the hearing. The matter was called to the attention of the commission last month, upon receipt of a complaint and petition of 160 residents of that locality, asking that depot facilities be provided the town, and that the trains of the railroad be required to stop there. The commission referred the complaint to the railroad officials, who ignored it, and now, after a preliminary examination of the allegations set out by petitioners the commission takes the matter up upon its own motion.
