The success of savings bank insurance in Massachusetts has led the New York legislature to plan a system that will give insurance at cost to people of small income. It is intended to have a policy provide life insurance and old age insurance on premium payments as low as 25 cents a month.

Judging from the space which a certain class of periodicals devote to the exposition and discussion of various uplift problems, such as children in the public schools, public playgrounds for children, sanitation in the home and home surroundings, social betterment and social morals, woman suffrage, etc., it is pre-eminently an age when women should acquire a firmer hold upon public affairs.

The national government is about to install at Pittsburgh the largest machine in the world for testing the strength of structural materials. A pressure equal to 5,000 tons can be brought upon a beam or column by this great machine. It was declared that the calamity of the Quebec bridge was due to ignorance concerning the strength of columns used in support of the superstructure. A machine which could test the capacity of a chord of the size of the one which snapped with such fatal and costly results at Quebec is yet to be built.

The machine at Pittsburgh, which will be operated by the government geological survey, is intended to test the strength of large blocks of stone, columns of concrete and brick used in the work of the government. One of the problems of building on a mammoth scale is to determine the relative safety, adaptability and durability of materials and to keep the cost at the minimum by using only what is necessary to insure strength. The information gained from these government tests will be shared with the engineers of the country.

Unfortunately they have discovered that people are ready to pay black-mail on demand. The Black Hand is based on strategy. Whenever a man who won't pay or can't pay is killed the timid rich shudder and are easy victims.

The international movement against the Black Hand, with prominent Italians at the front, is calculated to check the reign of terror long enough for those marked for plunder to take breath. Heretofore marked men have felt that all the Black Hand following was against them and only public sentiment with a weak police system for them. When organization is met by organization and desperation by determination, lawlessness bearded in its den by law, men of means will gradually stick up nerve to resist demands for money and the new brigandage must come to grief. "Millions to crush you, but not one cent to touch you" is the motto which will set the terror to working on the back track.

In his report for 1908 Secretary Wright urged legislation to provide for 600 additional officers in the regular army. Losses by death, retirement and resignation have caused a shortage, which hampers the service. The Military academy at West Point is prepared to train and graduate each year about two cadets to every million inhabitants, but owing to lack of material it graduates only half that number. This year there were 401 candidates for cadetships and only 142 admissions, the rejection being for physical or mental incapacity or for both combined. There has been a shortage for the past five years, for which the superintendent of the academy accounts, in part, as follows:

It may be the more remunerative opportunities in business that are diverting young men from a military career may be that, as the country is larger and more and more occupied with commercial pursuits, many young men who would make proper class material for West Point do not know of its existence. It is surprising how little is known about the Military academy by young men from throughout the country or at least how little is known as to the proper method of procuring an appointment.

Each congressional district is entitled to appoint one cadet every four years, and each state is entitled to two at large additional. All the expense of the cadet are borne by the government, and he is certain of a commission at graduation.

Farming Demonstration Train.

There is nothing more popular in Oregon and Washington, than the farming demonstration trains sent out by the Oregon Railroad and Navigation Company, and auspices of the Oregon Agricultural College. A special representative of the railroad company, A. A. Morse, called at The Observer's office Wednesday and gave us a few pointers concerning the train that is to be sent out next fall, and which is to put in half a day at each of the principal towns of Sherman county. The train will consist of 10 cars at least, divided as follows:

- No. 1. Live stock—sheep, hogs, beef and dairy cows; No. 2. Poultry; No. 3. Dairy implement; No. 4. Seeds for fall crops; No. 5. Grains and grasses; Others with machinery; farming implements; fruits, bees, etc. Lectures, and interchange of thought upon topics beneficial to the farm, will be leading parts of the daily program. We hope that every farmer in the county will make it a point to attend at least half of one day. We shall publish days and dates in time that all may become informed in advance of the arrival of the train at all points in the county that our people may prove to the demonstrators that We Do.
