The judge ruled that in that case the defendant had not violated the law, as such prescription did not authorize any druggist or other person to sell liquor, and if any whiskey was purchased through the prescription which did not conform to the law, the person who sold the liquor was the one who violated the law, and not the doctor who issued the prescription.
