Arrangements are being perfected for extending the Great Southern Railway from Dufur on toward the Klamath connection.

No. 2002 in Sing Sing prison, alias Capt. Peter C. Hains, hits the unwritten law a harder blow in 1909 than it has encountered before since it was invented by Sikes in 1859, and patented by McFarland in 1869.

We may not fully agree with Mr Roosevelt that he is justified in satisfying his thirst for blood in pursuing and killing the native beasts of Africa in their wild jungles, but we are ready to admit that he is right in declaring this country should be privileged to pick the class of immigrants allowed to come into the United States from other countries.

The lake Mohonk peace conference on the 24th advised limitation of armament, and called upon President Taft to invite all the great military and naval powers to act in conference along these lines. On the same day, without regard for the "Roosevelt polities," Secretary Meyer cut off \$10,000,000 in Navy Department estimates for the next year, at Washington. It may not be that this was in anticipation of the lake Mohonk report but it was evidently a good move on the part of Secretary Meyer, and one which the people of the United States will approve. It may not be possible to reduce expenses in all departments to as noticeable a degree, but the thing that will be accomplished in all directions is a more intelligent idea of harmonizing estimates and appropriations.

Discussing Patten's patriotic service The Morning Oregonian says: May wheat, and all of the distant options, are still moving skyward, much to the discomfiture of Secretary Wilson and the Wall Street crowd who took his March report seriously and sold short in the face of a world wide shortage in the cereal. Every prediction made by Patten has been verified. With but one week left in which to "smother him with the actual wheat," as per program, the May option sold yesterday at \$1.34 1/2, and cash wheat sold at \$1.50 per bushel. The sensational preachers who were so vehement in their denunciations of Patten when wheat was selling under \$1.20, should now acknowledge their error, and deliver a few sermons of praise for Patten's great service to the country in preventing the wheat from going abroad at lower figures than it was actually worth for home consumption.

The legislative committee report in Florida which says that two federal judges have been found carrying annual railroad passes is not a case of contempt of federal courts, but of contempt of the federal law by the federal courts. That is very certainly plain enough.

INJURY TO ANKLES.

How to Treat a Sprain by Simple Methods and Avoid Trouble.

If possible, as soon as an ankle is sprained put it under water as hot as water. The easiest way to manage this is in the tub under the hot and cold water spigot.

This treatment often allays the swelling and stops further trouble. It is well to summon the doctor at once in case of a bad sprain. If he is long in arriving, bandage with adhesive bandage or with adhesive plaster. For the former wrap it around the ankle and the middle of the foot alternately in the form of an eight. Cut the adhesive plaster in short strips and interlace them from side to side of the sprain, pulling tightly to hold the injured parts in place.

Making a shoe of medicated clay frequently reduces the inflammation. This should be renewed as fast as it dries up.

Rest the foot in a horizontal position, or, better yet, have it higher than the hips. When the ligaments are torn and the ankle must be rested on a pillow, much of the strain will be relieved by keeping the foot beyond the edge of the pillow, which is doubled up under the ankle.

When a sprain is bad, necessitating inaction for a long time, the circulation should be kept up by massaging frequently from the knees to the ankle, more particularly the calf of the leg. The massage movements should be upward. If this is kept up many times a day from the time of the accident, there will be no pain in walking, even after weeks of deuced muscles.

There is apt to be weakness for months after a hard sprain. To avoid further trouble one should wear a support of some kind. This may be a woven stocking made of rubber or silk, or a leather ankle that laces up the front and slips over the heel.
