The prodigal waste of timber during the last 40 years is estimated to average \$50,000,000 annually, or approximately \$2,000,000,000 worth of timber wasted. It is time there was a national movement to conserve our national resources and arrest the prodigal waste of our forests and the depletion of the fertility of the land. While Uncle Sam is no longer rich enough to give everybody a farm, there is plenty of agricultural land to support a population of 300,000,000 in the United States. Texas alone being capable of maintaining 80,000,000 people if all her arable land were under cultivation to cereals, fruit and vegetables.

This shows the sort of a paymaster Uncle Sam is. Here he is with an ace up his sleeve, contracted in the '60s and the United States Supreme court has just ordered him to pay in a little matter of \$181,358. Along in 1863 a man took a contract to supply the government with ice for the medical department of the army. The government got the ice, but refused to pay the bill, maybe because the pieces were not up to weight, or for some other insufficient reason. The man died but the bill still remained, and so the widow, after over 40 years of litigation, is to receive the money earned in 1863.

THE MARK OF GREAT EMPIRE.

The Alaska-Yukon Pacific Exposition just opened so auspiciously should mark an era in the development in the great imperial region whose products this exposition is designed especially to exhibit. For the first time Alaska is linked with the Pacific coast in a comprehensive display of possible productivity. A brief study of the territory immediately represented by the fair will be interesting, as well as profitable.

There are three states that border on the Pacific, but Idaho topographically belongs with the Pacific coast. Grouping, then, California, Oregon, Washington and Idaho with Alaska, the areas are as follows: Alaska, 590,884 square miles; California, 158,369; Oregon, 96,030; Washington, 69,189; Idaho, 84,800; grand total area, 999,254—practically 1,000,000 square miles, or about one third of the total area of the United States.

Consider population: California, 1,485,053; Oregon, 413,536; Washington, 518,103; Idaho, 161,772; Alaska, 63,592; total population, 2,642,056. This is only about one tenth the total population of the country. Here, then, is the great imperial strength of territory comprising nearly one-third the total area of the total of the United States, a region which vast tracts capable of intensive cultivation are still lying fallow; in this region live only one twentieth of the population of the United States, less than three persons to the square mile, on the average.

So the exposition is going to be to the rest of the country and to the world a lesson in geography, topography and opportunity. The rest of the country is surprisingly ignorant of the stupendous extent, the unexampled productiveness and the unexampled opportunities of this Western wonderland. If the Seattle exposition leads several thousand visitors from the East and from abroad to investigate the openings for profitable investment and the opportunities for home-making in this great Pacific West, it will not have been in vain.

He leaves a widow and five grown sons, one of them, Fred L. of The Observer office.

Warning to Young Men.

Through his deputy, C J Bright, J E Burdett, district attorney, requests publication of the following law now in force:

Sec. 1. If any person, being the owner, lessee, proprietor, or employee of any cigar store, public card room, saloon, barroom, public billiard room, soft drink establishment, or other public place of amusement, shall sell or permit any minor to engage in any game of cards, billiards, pool, bagatella, dice throwing, or other games of chance in such cigar store, public card room, saloon, barroom, public billiard room, public pool room, soft drink establishment or other public place of amusement, either for amusement or otherwise, such person shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not less than twenty-five nor more than one hundred dollars.

Sec. 2. If any minor shall represent and pretend to the owner, lessee, proprietor or employee of any place enumerated in Section 1, it is a crime, that such minor is twenty-one years of age or upward, for the purpose of inducing such person to suffer or permit such minor to engage in any of the things enumerated in said section, such minor, upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by a fine of not less than ten dollars nor more than one hundred dollars.

HOME AND FARM.

A little meal in the feed box will bring the cows promptly to the gate at milking time.

Sweet skim milk and a little flax jelly will induce rapid and healthy growth in the calf.

The side of an old berry crate cut to fit the bottom of the boiler, makes a good support to set jars on when canning.

Plant evergreen corn early in June for September use; toward the end of June plant early and late corn for October use.

Hens feel the warm weather as much as folks. Give them a shady place to sit down and rest once in a while. They will do all the better for it.

What is prettier than a bunch of thrifty chicks, all of one color and breed, and as much alike as so many peas? A bunch of Belgian colts.

When you go to bed at night, sweep your mind clear of everything and go to sleep. Failures, hopes, dreams, everything; let all go and rest up for the day that is coming.

Never tolerate a man on the farm who yanks, kicks or whips a team. Break your colts to walk down hill; but first break yourself; it is a bad practice to hurry horses down hill.

To make a berry pie that will not run over, line the tin with crust, then put in two table spoonfuls of sugar and mix with two table spoonfuls of flour. Fill with fruit; sweeten, sprinkle over this a few cracker crumbs. Make plenty of slashes in the crust; wet the edge of the lower crust and then put on the top crust and pinch the upper crust well to the lower crust.
