HOWE AND FERN.

Mrs. Marie W. Knox, of Spokane, took last prize (a \$75 range) at the recent cooking school, for the doughnut recipe: Beat three eggs light, and cream with them one cup granulated sugar; add three tablespoons of melted butter, a pinch of salt, a little nutmeg, and a pinch each of cinnamon and ginger. Take one quart of sifted flour, an even quart, in which is sifted well three teaspoons of baking powder; stir the flour a little at a time in the batter, beating thoroughly. Sprinkle the molding board with flour, and turn out one-half of the mixture; roll out and cut with a doughnut cutter. If the mixture should seem a little soft to roll do not add any more flour, but sprinkle over the rolling pin just enough to keep the roller from sticking. Fry in hot lard turning the cakes often. The secret of frying them well so they will puff up and brown evenly, is this: Turn and watch them while frying; take out of the fat and drain in a colander a few minutes; when cold put in a stone crock and they will keep tender a long time.

To make 40 gallons of vinegar: Take 10 gallons of apple juice fresh from the press and let it ferment fully, which may be about two weeks, or sooner if the weather is warm. Then add 10 gallons of like new juice for a second fermentation. In 10 weeks more add 10 gallons for a third fermentation, and 10 gallons more in two weeks. The third fermentation is material. Now stop the bung hole with an empty bottle neck down, and expose the barrel to the sun. The fermentation will be promoted by adding to the cider, at the beginning a quantity of mother of vinegar. Do not add water to the cider; the sweeter the cider the stronger the vinegar.

Quarterly Meeting and Election of Officers Sherman County Development League.

Every one in Sherman county is invited and urged to attend the quarterly meeting of the Sherman county Development League, to be held at Wasco next Tuesday, November 9th. Officers for the league for the ensuing year will be elected at this time. The business meeting and election will be held in Akers' opera house in the afternoon, beginning at 1:30. For the evening, an excellent literary program has been arranged, in which the best speakers and musicians from all the towns in the county will take part. A feature of the evening's entertainment will be an address by Mr. H. J. C. Unberger, Superintendent of the Sherman county Dry Farming Experiment Station, who will talk for half an hour on the plans that have been outlined for the experimental farm. This is a meeting which every farmer and business man in Sherman county should attend. The future success of the Development League will depend to a large extent upon what is done at Wasco at this time. If the proper spirit of enthusiasm is shown, the league can go ahead for another year stronger than ever, and the large amount of work that has been done during the past few months will begin to bring results. Since the league came into existence last spring, thousands of inquiries regarding this county have been received from every part of the United States, and a Sherman county pamphlet has been sent to every inquirer. The thing to be done now is well indicated by the following extract from a letter of October 26th, written to the secretary of the league, by Tom Richardson, manager of the Portland Commercial club: "Your booklet, going to every address we furnish you, is bound to bring results. The number of people inquiring now will come west by the hundreds in the spring, and the work you do this winter will be even more effective than in the past." If you are a member of the league, come to Wasco next Tuesday and help elect officers. If you are not a member, come and join the league.
