The number of employees now exceed the forces engaged at Gettysburg by 50 per cent which will be increased soon to 1,000,000, and its receipts and expenditures as large as the entire expenses of the government today. 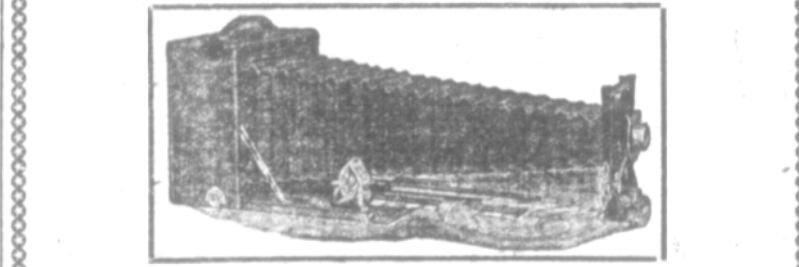
