If those laws are not enforced, then the will of the people is thwarted to the extent that their laws are nullified. If a law is a bad law, the remedy is to repeal it, not to disregard it; for if one law is ignored then the violation of other laws must be tolerated. Then comes graft on the part of some one for permitting the privilege of lawlessness. The privilege of lawlessness is never accorded where there is a profit made out of that privilege, without some kind of tribute for giving this privilege.

Open Columbia River Transportation.

Capt W S Buchanan, general manager of the Open Columbia River Transportation Company, spent several days at Celilo last week, where the steamer Twin Cities has been hauled out on the ways for repairs. She will be ready for commission about the 31st, and will go on the regular run to Lewiston. Returning from her first trip of the season the steamer Inland Empire arrived at Celilo while Capt Buchanan was there. She went up as far as Pasco and Kennebec, and had all the freight she could handle. It is expected that through business from Portland to the upper Columbia and Snake rivers will be fairly heavy this season. The steamer J N Teal, running daily between Portland and the Oregon Portage Railway, has just passed the annual inspection.

FREE SEEDS FOR FARMERS.

The O. R. & N. Demonstration Train To Distribute a Variety of Seeds.

Free seeds will be distributed by the train delegation to four Eastern Oregon beginning next Monday. The varieties will be Canadian field peas, Montana grown alfalfa and Minnesota corn. The seed will be given to farmers, selected at the various places to be visited by the Commercial clubs or the Farmer's Union. This system, it is believed, will bring better results than if the seeds were given out promiscuously as the farmers will be selected upon promise to carry out experiments with every possible care and attention. In this way it will be possible to ascertain exactly what results may be obtained. The train will arrive at Heppner Monday morning, where the first lecture will be given, between 8.45 and 10.45 a. m. Then the itinerary will be followed until the 31st in the following order: Monday, March 28.—Arrive at Condon 9 a. m., at Clem 2 p. m. Tuesday, March 29.—Arrive at Grass Valley at 9 a. m., leave 11 a. m.; at Moro arr. 11.30 a. m., leave 1.25 p. m.; Wasco arr. 3 p. m., leave 5 p. m. Wednesday, March 30.—At The Dalles 9 a. m.; Mosier 11.00; Hood River 1.00, leave 3.45. Col A A Morse will have charge of the train, and the following experts will lecture: Dr James Withycombe, director Oregon experiment station, Corvallis. Prof H D Scudder, agronomist, Oregon experiment station, Corvallis. Prof P J Kent, dairy husbandman, Oregon experiment station, Corvallis. Prof James Dryden, poultry husbandman, Oregon experiment station, Corvallis. H C Umberger, superintendent Moro experiment station. Morro, RW Allen, superintendent Umatilla experiment station, Hermiston. A L Applewhite, foreman O A C farm, Corvallis.
