Suit has been filed in the U S district court against the Baldwin Sheep and Land Company charging conspiracy to illegally obtain title to government land. The possessions of the company 26,000 acres, were recently disposed of to a Portland syndicate, at \$450,000. DesChutes Railway runs through the Baldwin ranch and a number of stations will be established on the line within the confines of the property. The Baldwin company was established in 1873; on the death of Dr Baldwin the property passed into the hands of Charles Cartwright and Jack Edwards, and on the death of Mr Cartwright it was taken by Mr Edwards.

An all Around Cordial Greeting. The ORN and OAC demonstration train, in Sherman county last Tuesday was fully up to expectations in every way. Demonstrations were made at Grass Valley, Moro and Wasco and large crowds greeted the train at every point. Dr Withycombe and the managers of the train were highly pleased with the reception accorded them and the words of praise that have been uttered by the farmers (and their wives) since, would please those who conducted the demonstrations. It was very gratifying to them to witness the advances at Moro Experiment Station, where Superintendent Umberger has the work in various stages of development, viz: the artesian well outfit drilling; plans for residence, office, laboratory, barns, etc., complete; over 600 experimental plots laid off; the farm plowed, and 200 plots placed in crop within the next 20 days. All for the farmer's benefit. It is enough to make everybody good natured—"don't it?" and cause Dr Withycombe, Professors Scudder, Dryden and others to realize that the next trip they will have to devote at least half a day to each of three stops in Sherman county.
