A \$30,000,000 stock dividend has been declared by the Singer Manufacturing company. The dividend is 100 per cent and the company has a surplus of \$30,000,000, from the tax of American families to protect the infant industry of sewing machine manufacturers.

John L. Williamson's open advocacy of a broad, comprehensive system of river improvement at the same time is in keeping with a sentiment that has been gaining ground across the Columbia for years. This sentiment will soon result in a practical, unanimous movement for river improvement in three of the New West states, including Idaho.

There will be no new party in the United States, and if one were organized Roosevelt would not be the leader of it, either with or without the support of Pinchot or Garfield. If any one is losing sleep over the imagined new party hints he is worrying about the faintest shadow of the idliest dream; parties are born, not made to order. They are born of necessity, not of whims or tea pot tempests. And there is nothing in existing political conditions to warrant even speculation concerning a new party.

Bill, here is your Chance. An amendment to the general deficiency bill, authorizing the secretary of the treasury to adjust and settle all unpaid claims of volunteers who served in the Oregon Cayuse Indian wars in 1847-8, was offered by Senator Chamberlain Saturday.

Have you read Gov. Gillett's letter to Attorney Gen. Webb? There is reason to believe that Gov. Gillett has signed the death warrant of prize fighting in America. In preventing the Jeffries-Johnson match in San Francisco he takes from the sport (so called) its last peg of support.

Two hours after the reception of Col Roosevelt at N.Y. City Saturday the whole metropolitan district was flooded by a downpour of rain, almost a cloud burst, which did great damage and caused several near-pans. The wind and rain took the city without warning; as it did in Moro Sunday forenoon; only worse.

Robert Hunter, the noted author of "Poverty," who married into the wealthy Stokes family Connecticut, has accepted the socialist nomination for governor in that state and says he will conduct an aggressive campaign, with speakers of national reputation. The state is full of dissatisfaction over the New Haven railroad monopoly and the revelations of official graft, and on this account expects his party to make great gains.

Senator Dolliver asserts that "no power can exclude him from the republican party," and in the same speech declares that he wants to "divorce the republican party from the corrupt leadership and the corrupt influences that have dominated it." Why he should wish to remain in a party that he denounces in this sweeping manner is not evident. He is simply disappointed in what he thought would be a tidal wave, but is just an eddy circling away from the main current. As long as the senator talks and acts like a democrat he reads himself out of the republican party.

Tom Richardson, manager of the Portland commercial club for the past six years, and secretary of the Oregon development league, who retires this month, will be succeeded by C. C. Chapman, by no means a stranger to Oregon, now an acknowledged advertising expert with several years that especially fits him for the position. He was chosen unanimously. We bespeak all possible assistance and support for Mr. Chapman, who is recommended to the various communities as a man thoroughly conscientious, earnest and capable; a natural born advertiser, and a tireless worker.

When James K. Polk was president of the United States, and while waiting for congress to ratify the treaty of peace with Mexico, just concluded, by him, he expressed much concern in reference to slavery. The agitation of this subject was rapidly reaching an acute stage, and Mr. Polk wrote in his private diary: "The slavery question is assuming a fearful aspect. And it is likely to be attended with terrific consequences to the country and cannot fail to destroy the democratic party, if it does not ultimately destroy the union itself." These prophetic words, uttered in 1846, were verified 15 years later.

## Senator Jay Bowerman Governor.

Hon. Jay Bowerman, State Senator, representing Sherman, Gilliam and Wheeler counties, and president of the senate, by virtue of his position as such, acceded to the Governorship of Oregon June 15th owing to the continued absence and sickness of Gov. Benson, who is under treatment in San Francisco, and will continue to discharge these duties until Gov. Benson returns. The treatment which Gov. Benson is undergoing will detain him in San Francisco for several weeks, however, and he is unwilling to permit the official business of the state to suffer because of his absence when the president of the senate has full authority to act. Gov. Benson has been suffering from a malignant case of lympos, a cutaneous disease rarely seen and closely akin to cancer. It is of long standing. This has been very acute of late and has given him much trouble.

Under the Oregon constitution, the secretary of state succeeds to the governorship in the event of that office becoming vacant for any reason. He is governor, in fact and not merely acting. With the resignation of Senator Chamberlain, then governor, Mr. Benson, then secretary of state, succeeded to the chief executive office. The conditions made him the incumbent of two state offices. The double work, coupled with his physical debility, worked to an almost complete breakdown, it is said, several weeks ago. Of the score or more boards and commissions in Oregon the governor is a member nearly all. Other state officers, in some instances, are members of these boards and commissions. In several instances where there are only three members of these, the governor and secretary of state constitute two members. In his official capacity as governor and secretary of state, Gov. Benson constitutes a majority of these boards and without his presence business could not be transacted. In consequence of his absence state business has piled up in some of the departments to a point where action is now needed imperatively. For instance negotiations that have been pending for loans with the school land board, on which Gov. Benson constitutes a majority are held up. There are those intimately acquainted with the situation who predicted it many weeks ago and who assert that Gov. Benson will not again assume the duties of his office. Little doubt is expressed that Mr. Bowerman will remain in charge until the expiration of the term. Mr. Bowerman has an ambition to be governor and some time ago announced that he would be a candidate before the republican state assembly, July 21st. That his succession to the governor's chair will give him material political prestige is regarded as true.

In passing a law to abolish bridge whist the Louisiana legislature aims to give husbands a chance to get acquainted with their bridge-playing wives. Future solons will doubtless take measures to give women a chance to get acquainted with their poker-playing husbands.
