## A Short Wheat Crop.

Contrary to general speculative expectation the government wheat crop report showed an alarming reduction in anticipated wheat harvest through the middle and western states.

For some time large wholesale firms have complained that dealers have been cutting down on orders and even countermanding where possible.

The ordinary public gave no thought to these conditions until railroad and other industries cut seriously into their orders for goods; resulting in a panic, called by courtesy a slump, and Northern Pacific shares of stock fell \$4 each, as well as other railroads proportionately, as a result of their owners considering, that with their employees forcing higher wages, the railroad commissioners ordering freight rate reductions; the crop shortage cutting into their business, their earnings were very liable to fall below expense of operation.

The crop shortage does not alone affect the middle west. Here on the coast we feel the effect as for instance the putting of two large lumber mills, of Washington on half time because of canceled orders from that section, which laid off railroad trains as well as mill men.

And now to come home, the Portland papers are each day talking big crops in this territory where such is not the case. They know better, but Portland papers and their correspondents are following the Seattle spirit of large, unavailing figures which have no foundation in fact. Last year a visitor to the Palouse section was told they had less than an average, but it was understood that Sherman, Umatilla and Gilliam crops were large; when none had a good average crop year. The Portland papers were backing up the large wheat buyers in getting as cheap wheat as possible by deluding less posted buyers to the detriment of the wheat grower.

This year the same thing is going on, as witness the crop prospect articles on Sherman county by the Daily Journal's special correspondent who comes to one place in this county, secured figures on the best crop in sight and used that as an average.

Sherman county will have almost a third more wheat than last year; very little more, possibly less; it will be better quality; but a large number of farmers resent, and have asked the Observer to voice the sentiment, as to the crop misrepresentation by which the outside wheat buyer is lead to believe we are going to have an enormous crop, and he can take his time to buy.

Judge Wm Henrichs was exhibiting a sample of Early Ohio potatoes Tuesday that were grown in his home garden in Moro, without irrigation, that would put to blush many potatoes put upon the market grown in other localities, and make them look like culls. This is but a fair sample of what Sherman county soil will produce if but given a chance. The chemical composition of our soil is such that it is admirably adapted to potato growing as well as for cereals.

## Wingless Chickens.

Chicken wings will disappear when the new wingless chickens raised by W A Bertram of Illinois becomes common. He has found that wings decrease the value of chickens in the cities and towns by making confinement in yards more difficult. He conceived the idea by crossing common breeds with the Wyandottes and Barred Rocks, having wings smaller in proportion to their weight than of other chickens. After several seasons he has produced a funny looking thing which has only a few pin feathers where nature meant wings to be and which can not jump a fence higher than two feet. It will be easier to fatten chickens which do not reduce their weight by the exertion of flying. Putting more flesh on the drumsticks and wish bones will compensate for the disappearance of the wings.
