NEW STYLE COMBINE.

Uses Eight Horses and Two Men to Head, Thresh, and Sack the Grain.

Thursday last week a representative of The Observer accompanied H. U. Martin and wife and L. Barnum, by the aid of Mr. Barnum's auto, to the vicinity of Rutledge where H. C. Jorgensen has one of the Idaho Combine Harvesters in operation on the farm of Wm. Curry, cutting volunteer 40-fold wheat. The land being cut over is very rolling, and so steep in places that the horses seem to be able only to push the machine, but the ground shows that everything is being saved, even better than a Holt combine can.

Mr. Jorgensen informed us that the machine was well put up, does exceedingly good work; that the bull wheel does not give ground, but sticks to its work. But the best feature of all was that it did not crack the wheat in any way, and the smut balls were blown out without being broken. This last feature being an important one from a milling buyers stand point. The machine was received at Moro Saturday and the following Tuesday was cutting grain; four horses taking the machine through summer fallow fields to where it is working.

Mr. Jorgensen expects to cut between 12 and 15 acres each day, based upon present work, when cutting his own grain; the machine has a re-cleaner which does its work thoroughly. Where those on the Jorgensen farm like the machine best is its extreme simplicity; in turning the corners it saves considerable time each round as it is built much like a header, and drives in the same way, thus letting the horses work freer than on a larger machine. The main points of the machine over its small horse power and labor, is its extremely short drafter and the fact that it has an active seven foot cylinder and separator the full width of the cut; grain going into the machine something like a bundle machine in the valley, heads first. By this method there is no choking down of the separator.

Without doubt this machine will be more extensively used than the Holt combines have been in this country. The only criticism that can lie against it is the absence of a straw carrying device, which will be added on all models after this season. Mr. Jorgensen said if one would not do the work he was going to get another.
