In business and politics the "dreamer" is a term of reproach, and yet this whole nation and this mighty continent was once the fabric of a sailor's dream.

The annual regatta of the Astoria club will occur this year August 29th to 31st. W. W. Robinson, one of Portland's leading business men and club leaders, has been selected as admiral.

July 18th, Gov. Bowerman and staff were given a reception aboard the United States gun boat Yorktown in Portland harbor and the workings of a state naval militia were explained in detail to Oregon's chief executive officer.

Two members of the Taft cabinet, Wickersham and Nagle, are to spend their summer vacation in Alaska for a period of eight weeks, going on the fish commission boat Albatross, for the purpose of getting data on which the president may act when legislation for that territory is again brought to the attention of congress.

It is not every man who can lie. Many of them try it, but they are unartistic and painfully disgraceful failures. They go about it so clumsily that they make a sad botch of it from the very beginning.

There is reason to believe that the surgeon who is quick on the trigger to operate on the slightest excuse has had its longest day. Protest against him is coming, not so much from the general public as it is from the men of his own particular profession.

The Inland Empire stands 2d in wheat production for export. The crop is passed off through Portland, which New York alone surpassed last year. The total exported for the year closed June 30, 1910, amounted to 5,770,319 bushels, valued at \$5,593,765, which, while lower than that of the year previous, permitted us to move her into second place, where a year ago she stood fifth.

THE REPUBLICAN PARTY IN OREGON.

Once more the Republican party will come into its own in Oregon if the large number of voters over the state calling themselves members so desire.

Regardless of what interested newspapers, who are fighting the "get together spirit" of the rejuvenated Republican party may say, the Republican assembly held last week in Portland was in no sense a slate. There were candidates who were around asking the different delegations to support them for office recommendations, but it can be truthfully said that outside of the recommendation for Governor very few if any delegates had an idea, up to the assembly day, where he would cast his ballot of recommendation.

As to slate raised by the Daily Journal of Portland, and talk of the corporation interests being back of the recommendation of Mr. Jay Bowerman for governor, it was known that those largely representing any who might be said to be that sort, were fighting with all their power the recommendation of Mr. Bowerman for governor with the prayer of the old maid in the woods who answered the owl by crying "Any man, O, Lord, any man."

Senator Jay Bowerman can, and will, give the democratic ticket, which will be aided this year by our republican senator Mr. Bourne and all who can be brought to their aid on the false cry of preserving the rights of the people, the liveliest run of its history.

Mr. Bowerman is a young man, only 34 years old in August, and worked his way through college by working on a farm in Marion county as an ordinary farm hand. He studied to such purpose that he was admitted as a lawyer before he was 21, and shortly after moved to Condon where he made himself one of the foremost lawyers of Oregon.

Representatives W. R. Ellis and W. C. Hawley were both recommended for return to congress.

F. W. Benson was recommended for a second term as secretary of state to succeed himself.

For supreme court vacancies Judge F. A. Moore, present chief justice; Judge T. A. McBride, at present a member of the court; Judge G. H. Burnette, of Marion county, who gave Thorburn Ross of a busted Portland bank such a stiff sentence as to put a crimp on bank wrecking; and Wallace M. McCamant of Portland, were recommended for nomination.

W. J. Clark was recommended for state printer. Some think this office should go to Willis Duniway, present incumbent, for the second time; others, taking into consideration that Mr. Duniway is credited with clearing for himself from the office close to \$80,000 each year he has had it, are of the opinion that he should step down.

For state treasurer a man of financial experience was chosen in

R. W. Hoyt of Portland.

For state superintendent of public instruction, L. R. Alderman, of the State University was chosen. He is the originator of the school children fairs in which boys compete in garden, and girls in house work for prizes.

O. P. Hoff, as labor commissioner, J. H. Lewis, as state engineer, were each recommended; for another term to their offices.

For railroad commissioner, F. J. Miller was recommended, mostly because he was not the choice of any who might, by a stretch, be considered a railroad man. He is a successful business man and if elected both sides of a transportation rate contest will be treated fairly, but no more.

For attorney general J. N. Hart was recommended. It took three close ballots to do so. He is eminently qualified for the position and has made a study of new questions likely soon to arise in the state on land and water questions.

For representatives from this district, Col. C. A. Buckley of Sherman county, and Hon. W. J. Mariner of Gilliam county, were recommended.

Hon. R. R. Butler, present incumbent, was unanimously recommended to succeed himself as judge of the circuit court for this district.

Judge R. R. Butler made the premier speech of the Republican Assembly at Portland last week while nominating Jay Bowerman for recommendation as Governor of Oregon. That speech did more to arouse an interest in Western Oregon to the fact that Eastern Oregon has men of ability within its boundaries, than any other incident that has occurred for some time past. It also demonstrated that from now on we cannot concede that Multnomah county has within its limits, all the men of ability in Oregon.

The bureau of health of the Austrian home ministry has taken a positive stand against the bezoated-doped foods imported from America, at least all foods containing more than one-fortieth of one per cent, which is the Austrian standard.

Oregon's apple show will be held in Portland November 30th to December 2d. It will be a great exposition of the state's fruit-growing possibilities and of wide interest because of Oregon's fame as the home of the big red apple.
