The President's Pay.

The Albany Press has the following: Probably most persons are under the impression that the presidential office costs the country \$75,000 a year at the present time, and \$25,000 for traveling expenses—or a total of \$100,000. But Representative G. M. Hitchcock of Nebraska, has recently assembled all the sums annually expended on account of the presidential office, and finds them to be as follows:

Salary of the President.....	\$75,000
Traveling expenses.....	25,000
Ordinary care of White House.....	35,000
Fuel.....	6,000
Greenhouse.....	9,000
Stables.....	35,000
Lighting.....	1,000
Police.....	22,000
Secret Service.....	3,500
Contingent expenses.....	25,000
Clerks and employees.....	69,000
Repairs.....	15,000
Greenhouse repairs.....	3,000
Total.....	\$323,500

Even this aggregate takes no account of the annual expense of the cruiser Mayflower, the Dispatch boat Dolphin, and the gunboat Sylph, all three of which are used in a personal and social way, for the recreation of the President and his friends. Their expenses would easily bring the cost of the presidential office up to \$500,000 a year.

If State Printer Dunnaway has made a saving to the taxpayers of the state of \$40,000 in three years why does he not show it by facts and figures? All this great saving is credited to utterances by the state press through articles written or inspired by the State Printer himself. In fact all such savings were made by the Secretary of State under conditions over which Dunnaway had no control. The figures quoted by William J. Clark, the republican, flat salary candidate, who stands alone as pledged to this great reform, are taken from the records in the Secretary of State's office. They are "material and contain facts and figures which the voter and taxpayer should know," says Judge Galloway, (democratic) circuit judge of the Third District.

Gapes in Chickens.

As this disease is common among chickens at this season of the year, we print an effective remedy taken from the Bulletin of the Pennsylvania department of agriculture: "Dip the tip of a feather into kerosene or lamp oil, and insert it into the windpipe of the chicken. The shank of the feather should be stripped of its side barbs and only the tip remain to act as a soft feather brush. By opening the mouth of the chicken and pulling the tongue slightly, the opening in the windpipe is to be seen, and the feather can be inserted." This does not cause much pain, and the operation is soon finished. It appears that one touch of the oil against the gape worm is enough to kill it, even though it is not removed with the feather at the time of treatment.

The Fashion is Many-Colored Weeds.
