GENERAL NEWS OF THE DAY.

Comment Suggested upon Topics as They are Presented to Readers.

Prof. Fernot has pleased the Bend folk. His analysis of Des Chutes river water is in favor of the fluid; which he pronounces good; and that "the septic tank overflow" "is not harmful."

S S Wolever, a well known farmer south of Mitchell, was much surprised recently when one of his checks on a Dalles city bank came back marked not sufficient funds. An investigation developed the fact that a recent hired man, with whom he had been too confidential, had checked the account to its dregs. Mr Wolever will get his money back, however; as the drafts were pure forgeries.

Cardinal Vincenzo Vannutelli, representative of Pope Leo X. to the Eucharistic congress recently held in Montreal, was in St Paul last week, accompanied by his suite on a visit to Archbishop Ireland. Beside visiting the various Catholic institutions in St Paul he was entertained at luncheon at the home of Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Hill. Following the luncheon the cardinal visited Minneapolis, and at night a dinner was given at Archbishop Ireland's residence, attended by all of the Bishops of the archdiocese.

The Inland Empire is beginning to realize more fully than ever the value to the state of the big packing plant recently established at Portland. It is a great stimulus to the stock industry, and is causing it to grow rapidly.

Where land that could not be sold for \$100 per acre will bring \$1,000 when planted to fruit, it is time for the farmer to get next, and take care of his trees.

The wind of last week played havoc with early apples in Washington county, and hundreds of bushels were blown to the ground. Thrifty growers picked up windfalls, which were slightly bruised, and sold them at 50 cts. per box. Less thrifty people, too busy to even destroy weeds, left them on the ground for the yellow jackets.

James H. Messenger, who has been suffering from a paralytic attack for some time, died at his home on Crooked river Sept 19th long and highly respected as an Oregon pioneer.

A LaFollette man already dead and known to be so, was nominated in Wisconsin in order to beat an assembly candidate.

The volcanoes of Alaska have been active for five months past. The sch W H Diamond, in going through Unimak pass had her rigging set on fire by hot ashes. A new island was added to the Bogoslof group in the Aleutian chain, at the same time. The island rose from deep water at a point where the geodetic survey last year shows 70 fathoms of water.

H W Niles, who owns a farm five miles east of Vollmer, valued at \$50 per acre, had 60 acres of it planted to potatoes this year, from which he has gathered \$4,200 worth of tubers, about \$70 from each acre.

The case of Prof James is most interesting for the reason that he had entered into a solemn agreement with several of his life long and trusted friends to send back confidential messages, if such thing were possible. The messages not to be communicated to any other human beings save Prof James' associates. The scheme must have slipped a cog somewhere in the arrangement, as up to this time not a signal has come from the mysterious beyond, and in all likelihood no spirit communication will ever come from the dead scientist; the veil will remain as dark and forbidding as at the dawn of the world's history.

Talks About the Household.

To thicken peach jelly which otherwise remains too liquid, use 1/2 tart apples to 1/2 peaches.

Stone a quart of plums; stew, and then sweeten using a generous cupful of sugar. Line a dish with slices of buttered bread; pour in the plums, boiling hot; cover the dish and set away to cool gradually. Serve cold with cream.

Tomato relish. One peck of ripe tomatoes peeled cold, chop and let drain over night; six onions cut fine, three heads of celery, five red peppers, one small cup of salt; drain off and add two lbs of brown sugar, two ounces of white mustard seed, five cups of vinegar. Put in glass jars cold, do not cook.

Succotash. To make succotash cover 1 pint of Lima beans with hot water, add 1 teaspoonful of salt and boil 20 minutes; drain and add 3 teaspoonful of corn, 1 teaspoonful of cream, 2 tablespoonfuls butter, return to the fire and cook for five minutes longer; season with 1 teaspoonful of salt, and 1/2 teaspoonful of good white pepper.

Squash Puff. Press dry cooked summer squash thru a sieve; to 1 1/2 pints of squash add 2 tablespoonfuls of melted butter, 1/4 cup of milk, 1/2 teaspoonful of salt, 1/4 tea spoonful pepper and 2 beaten egg yolks. Mix thoroughly, fold in 2 beaten egg whites and turn into a buttered mold. Set in a pan of hot water and bake in the oven until center is firm. Serve turned from the mold, accompanied with rich cream sauce.
