Farming by Legislation Expensive.

There are farmers, many of 'em, in Sherman county, who openly denounce the herd law as the primary cause of so many noxious weeds. In a letter to The O. Man of this shack one, as good farmer as we have in Sherman county, says: "You will find my land all under good fence, and that is protection for me against the city cow or other stock in the lanes, which were the best weeders you ever saw. But no, the stock must be legislated out; how is it now? Look at my herd law neighbor's fencing! Look at his wire; look at his posts; look at the lanes on all sides of him; weeds to beat all creation—gone to seed, making \$300 extra work on my farm, which you know I try to keep clean; allowing my h. l. neighbor time to chip in at poker for cigars dependent upon an act of the legislature to keep his fences up. Look at that Russian thistle bowling across my summer fallow! a part of the proceeds from legislative farming."

Successful Farming.

N W Silvers & Son aren't sorry that they cast their lot in Sherman county. They have been able to pay off a \$5,000 obligation four months before maturity this fall, and still have enough to keep the wolf from the door. This payment was for land purchased since they came to Sherman county. Mr Silvers is a progressive farmer, and has demonstrated that a good crop is almost certain with 20 inches of moisture below the surface. Less than that is uncertain, very much more than that is dangerous. With 20 inches the roots penetrate the soil, and forms a vigorous stand; on much more than 20 inches the roots spread out, do not go down, and burn quickly under the 4th of July sun.
