The Republican Candidates.

As election day draws near it may not be amiss to remind the republicans of Sherman county that now is the time for all good men and true republicans to come to the aid of the party nominees. Men who believe in the principles and policies of the republican party and are proud of its achievements, should remember that when candidates are unanimously nominated at the primary election, they deserve, and should receive, every republican vote in the county. All candidates for county offices have been known to all of us from a dozen to 30 years, and are in all respects well qualified for the positions for which they have been named. Our candidate for governor, Hon. Jay Bowerman, is so well and favorably known that we believe he will receive every republican vote in the county. The republican candidate for representative in the legislature, Col. C. A. Buckley, is too well known as a substantial and public spirited citizen to need more than passing mention. Alert, vigilant, resourceful and uncompromisingly honest, he should receive every republican vote in this county, and in both Gilliam and Wheeler. Don't be hoodwinked. Let us wake up and be alive again, if only for one day, the 8th of November next.

A Bit of Information.

We have been asked for our authority for the assertion that the right would be given to any person clothed with a little authority to enter your home and ransack the house, morning or midnight, with little or no pretense of wrong doing to warrant such intimidation.

Any voter can find the following in the pamphlet issued by the secretary of state, among the provisions of the state wide prohibition law:

Section 4. It is made the special duty of the district attorney to file or have filed a complaint in the circuit court of any county, or any justices' court therein against all houses and the keepers thereof, used for the manufacture, sale or exchange or gift, for the purpose of evading this law, of any kind of intoxicating liquors in any county or in any town in this state where local devices are resorted to to prevent or avoid detection of

the keeper thereof, and upon such complaint being so filed describing a place where the device is kept, OR SUSPECTED of being kept, and the name of the person violating this law, if known, said circuit judge or justice of the peace, or other magistrate, shall issue his warrant commanding any sheriff or constable to search such place, and if the law is being violated to arrest the person or persons so violating the law, and it shall be the duty of the sheriff or constable of the county wherein is situated any such place or house where such device is kept for the sale or exchange of intoxicating liquors, or the gift of the same for the purpose of evading this law, having obtained a warrant for that purpose, to demand admission into the same, and upon admittance being refused, the sheriff or constable is hereby authorized and required by law to force open the same, and arrest and hold for trial before the courts all such persons as shall violate any of the provisions of this law.

That section speaks for itself. Any one who has a grudge against another may swear to a "suspicion" of wrong doing and that residence will be ransacked, preferably at midnight, if the law officers "know their duty," and if they do not, then it can be said that "they notified the man."

No district attorney, sheriff, or constable, for any reason, dare refuse to search any place, against which a "suspicion" has been lodged. But when they do, and find nothing to warrant such "suspicion," then the county is in for a suit for damages, which, after the law gets to working will look very much like expensive taxation when compared to the amount paid for taxes under our present system.

This argument of high taxes under the present system and the claim of the elimination of tax to a minimum under proposed state prohibition, is the ground work on which state prohibition is based; but if the voter will consider the future cost of supporting it the appeal to him may not appear quite so forcible.

People of discriminating nature who are practiced in the habit of looking up such matters, and the cost of operation, can see that increased cost; others do not want the voters to see that part of it.
