John Dunn brought an 18 mos. old pig to Moro on the 21st, from his John Day Farm, that dressed 276 lbs. The pig was fed chiefly on alfalfa.

A number of friends surprised Mr and Mrs Umberger at their new home at the Experiment Farm Saturday night. After the customary congratulations the company was seated and 500 enjoyed in due form. Honors of the evening were awarded to Mrs Anna Moore, and Roy Powell. Refreshments were served and the new home practically warmed, when the party adjourned, highly pleased with the enjoyments of the evening.

A Few Sherman County Pioneers Meet

A bunch of old-timers got together by chance in Moro Saturday afternoon. There was Jack Thompson, Alf Dillinger, Simon Elcock, John Holman, Dan McLachlan, Dr Sanders, Lew Schadewitz, The O Man, et al, all in a reminiscent mood, and topics on interesting events happening in the trying days of pioneering were spun together in a jolly way, quite different from the time they originated. Each yarn was founded upon fact. Dan told about taking his family to The Dalles one time in a big lumber wagon, camping by the roadside, where wood, water and grass was convenient. The object of the trip was to buy some calico, with which to make some dresses for Mrs Me and the children.

John Holman told about the winter of 1893-4 when we had to burn wheat for office and household. The wheat represented a cash value expended of 10 cents for each empty sack, and 14 cents per 100 lbs for threshing, besides cost of production, and the bills were paid, but actually was worth nothing, because it was rotted and sprouted in the sacks by rain storm after rain storm and was sold for junk (the best of it), at whatever one could get for it. John arranged a can with a self-feeder spout and one of them was used in The Observer office for burning wheat at 10 cts a sack in lieu of fir wood at \$12 per cord. It worked like a charm, but the smell of the burning wheat caused The O Man to vacate and move into this shack.

Dillinger told a good story about his troubles in paying for The Observer in 1894. The paper was then \$2 per annum, but Alf didn't have the ready cash and wanted to pay us in coyote skins, which a barber down at Rufus would make into very handsome rugs on shares but we could not take them on that proposition, as bed bugs would claim the rugs inside of 30 days. We finally persuaded Alf to continue a subscriber until "the

times improved," which he did, without loss to either of us.

The conduct of Eugene V Debs, Coxe and Old Jupiter Pluvius, brought about the greatest railway wrecks across the continent, and worst floods in the Inland Empire in 1894 that white man had ever witnessed. A perfect famine for groceries, lights, flour, etc., existed for months. We parched barley, as a beverage in lieu of tea and coffee, then had no sugar with which to sweeten it. We remember one day learning that Steve Hayes acquired 25 lbs of sugar in a quiet deal. Taking a small paper sack along we approached Mrs Hayes, and begged permission to see the sugar. Finally she condescended and permitted us to see the treasured goods; in a sack, in a keg, in the dug-out cellar, back of the house; with the caution that after we had looked at the sugar we should carefully tie the string and replace the sack.

We should like to spin a few more of the yarns that were told on this occasion, but want of time and space will not admit of it today. The stories will keep, however, and someday, before starting up yonder, if we don't start too soon; we shall take pleasure in again referring to the good old Pioneer days in Sherman county.
