The calf should be well fed, but a lot of calves are "fed to death." Four quarts of skim milk a day is enough for a 6-weeks-old calf; as soon as any sign of bowel complaint shows in the droppings reduce the quantity of milk. Give a calf all the hay and bran it will eat, and if possible let it run on grass part of every day, but do not overfeed on skim milk. The calf that is reared naturally gets only a small quantity of milk at a time.

E W Dooley, the horse buyer from North Yakima, spent \$18,890 in Sherman county last week for five car loads of horses; three cars were bought at Wasco, one of them from G N Crosfield for \$4,000; one car at Moro and one car at Kent and Grass Valley. Dooley paid \$250 for a Clyde, "a ton horse," from Herbert Root, the sire of which is owned by J M Allen.
