ITEMS OF INTEREST THROUGHOUT OREGON

Chronicle of Important Events
of Interest to Our
Readers.

Winter Course Opens January 3.
Corvallis—The winter short course at the Oregon Agricultural College will commence January 3, continuing for a period of six weeks and will be followed immediately by a special course commencing February 13 and extending over a period of one week which will be known as Farmers' Week. This announcement has just been made by the chairman of the course committee.

The work will cover a six weeks' course in agronomy, animal husbandry, poultry husbandry, horticulture, dairying, domestic science and art, mechanic arts and forestry. Under these various heads the most practical work that can be possible will be offered to the short course students. The work is designed to meet the requirements of men and women, old and young.

Man Killed and Robbed.

Salem—As he drove under the covering of a lonely bridge near the State Reform School, two miles south of this city, J. E. Roberts, a well-known real estate dealer of Salem, was shot and killed and then robbed of \$500.

Roberts was found dying on the plank of the bridge by Earl Gardner, who drove onto the bridge shortly after the murder was committed. Gardner, however, did not hear the shooting, and the murderer or murderers had escaped in the darkness. Two bullets had pierced Roberts' hat and a third lodged in the left side of his head, near the top of the skull. He lived but an hour, dying without regaining consciousness.

12,000 ACRES THROWN OPEN

Lakeview—The throwing open to settlement of a tract of about 12,000 acres in the Lakeview land district, which has been a part of the Silver Lake irrigation project in northern Lake county, has created quite a demand from the officials for information regarding these lands. The lands are nearly all close to Silver Lake, and some of them are along its shores. The soil is deep, rich and capable of growing grain and alfalfa without irrigation. One feature that commends the new lands to settlers is the fact that good water, fuel from the forest reserve and lumber within a reasonable distance of the land are to be obtained at slight effort, and while this is not a citrus fruit belt, it is one of the most productive portions of Oregon, and one that is being rapidly opened to railway transportation. The climate is the healthiest in the western country. This land is to be opened November 25 to settlement, and these who desire these lands will have to be here before that time to get located and be able to settle by that time.

BANK CASHIER SUICIDE.

Doors of Seaside Institution Are Closed.

Seaside—Rather than face a term in state's prison and hundreds of his fellow citizens who put their faith and money into the Bank of Seaside, which he had wrecked to save from a financial crisis a lumber company controlled by him and his brother, E. N. Henninger, the cashier, committed suicide on his doorstep here.

The bank did not open its doors and its condition and the loss that will be suffered by depositors in the crash of the institution will not be known until the bank examiner has made an investigation.

The wrecking of the bank, with its tragic climax that came when the cashier blew out his brains with a rifle just as a fellow citizen and friend passed his residence, furnishes as dramatic a story of high finance as can be found in fiction.

Reform Library Started.

Eugene—Through the efforts of Professor Young, head of the department of economics, a bureau of statistics has been established in the university library which, it is believed, will be of great service to the state at large in municipal matters. This new feature will be in the form of a municipal reform library which is to be a sort of clearing house for all municipal literature. Oregon cities and city reform organizations desiring to investigate questions relative to improved city government will have free access to all records and references. The idea of such a bureau at the university was suggested by similar ones at the universities of Wisconsin, Kansas and Illinois and of Brown University, where similar libraries have proved of great service to municipalities and improvement leagues.

TWO TRAINS COLLIDE ON GREAT NORTHERN

Eight Killed and Four Injured
When Fast Freight Trains
Collide.

Spokane—Eight are known to be dead and four known to be more or less seriously injured as a result of one of the most disastrous freight wrecks in the history of the Great Northern Railroad, near Chattaroy, Wash., early Sunday morning. The wreck was the result of a head-on collision around a sharp curve in a deep cut, fairly at the bottom of two steep grades. Two heavily loaded trains running at an exceptional rate of speed combined almost every condition possible to make the impact so disastrous.

Train No. 451, running on its regular schedule, westbound, collided with the "apple extra," eastbound, running on a fast schedule of five hours between Hilliard, Wash., and Troy, Mont. Train No. 451 was loaded with paints, oils, some furniture and some livestock, much of it extremely inflammable material and considerably lighter than the apple extra, which carried, besides fruit, heavy loads of grain and furniture.

Every man of both train crews who happened to be near the front of his train is dead. One brakeman saved himself by jumping, but he is seriously injured.

Rear-Brakemen Escape.

The brakemen who happened to be in the rear of their trains escaped with minor injuries.

The loss in the wreck is very large. A pile of 19 cars of train No. 451, jammed into the space of an ordinary living room, caught fire immediately and were speedily reduced to a mass of tangled, writhing steel before the fire apparatus, summoned from Spokane, 21 miles away, could start a stream of water on the ruins.

Rioting in Express Strike.

New York—With the word that all hope of settling the strike of the express drivers had gone by the board, there was a renewal of rioting all through the central section of the city. Wagons driven by strikebreakers were attacked, the men were pulled from their seats and beaten, and harness was slashed from the horses.

The termination of negotiations was precipitated by a letter to Mayor Gaynor by the companies stating that the only condition upon which they would take back the strikers was by individual application not later than Monday.

NEITHER REACHED POLE

London—A dispatch from Copenhagen declares that Knud Rasmussen, who went to Etah to investigate the North Pole discovery claims of Dr. Frederick Cook, is now convinced that neither Cook nor Peary reached the pole, and that no one has yet come within hundreds of miles of the top of the earth. Rasmussen's conclusions are based on his own investigations and on statements made to him by Missionary Olson, who questioned the Eskimos used by both Cook and Peary.

Straits Will Be Flown.

Havana—Arrangements are being made for an aeroplane flight across the Florida straits from Havana to Key West, probably in December. The distance is over 90 miles, but conditions for flying, it is claimed, are favorable at this season.

The Havana Post has offered a prize of \$5000. It is said that Glenn H. Curtiss, Hears, Ely and Baldwin will compete.

Government Will Not Act.

Washington—No action is anticipated by the State Department regarding reports that Belle Elmore Crippen is alive. After the reports forwarded to Washington are presented to the State Department, it is declared they would be referred to the British Embassy or the English Consul in Philadelphia, as the case is considered solely within the jurisdiction of the criminal courts of England.

Will Train Aviators.

Washington—Plans for an aerial squadron will be presented to Congress, the number of the air machines to be provided being left by the War Department to the lawmakers. This was announced by Major General Wood, chief of staff of the army.

Theatrical War Over.

New York—An agreement has been reached between Frohman, Klaw, Brannigan and John Cort whereby attractions of the former will hereafter be booked in houses controlled by the National Theater Owners' Association.

Iowa Population Falls.

Washington—The population of the state of Iowa is 2,224,771, according to the enumeration in the thirteenth census. This is a decrease of 7,082 or .03 per cent under 2,231,853 in 1900. The increase from 1890 to 1900 was 219,572, or 10.7 per cent.

FOREIGN NEWS BITS

General Juan J. Estrada will continue as provisional president of Nicaragua for two years, receiving the support of the conservative party.

The Republic of Portugal has granted amnesty to political offenders and reduced the prison sentences of all criminals one-third.

The Spanish senate by a vote of 149 to 68, passed the "padlock" bill, which prohibits the creation of further religious establishments in Spain until the revision of the concordat with the Vatican has been completed.

Germany has rejected the American proposal in connection with the potato export from that country, contracted for by American interests, and thereby brought on imminent danger of a tariff war with the United States.

The belief is growing that the government will present a measure providing for a remodeling of the British empire at the coming session of parliament. It is agreed that something must be done to meet the demand for the abolition of the house of lords.

William Victor Baker, who was known throughout the English speaking world as the "blind gospel singer," was found dead in bed by his wife at Los Angeles. He was 70 years of age.

Christy Mathewson has just signed a contract with the New York Baseball club for next season at the highest salary ever paid in the history of the game. It is understood that Matty will receive for his services next season \$15,000.

John E. Redmond, the leader of the Irish parliamentary party, who has been touring the United States in behalf of the Irish cause, has sailed for home. Mr. Redmond said that he and the other Irish parliamentary visitors had received pledges of \$150,000 in aid of the Irish cause and expected \$50,000 additional.

The use of Admiral "Bob" Evans' name in a broadside advertisement of stock in a California Oil company, of which he is president, is the subject of editorial criticism in the Army and Navy Register, a weekly publication in Washington, devoted to the news of those services. The paragraph of an officer in a stock selling enterprise is severely condemned.

Dr. Hawley H. Crippen, the American dentist convicted of the murder of his wife, Belle Elmore, the actress, in London, will be hanged November 23.
