The Moro girls are twice winners at basket ball in contests with Grass Valley players, and Moro boys have been twice defeated by the Grass Valley boys.

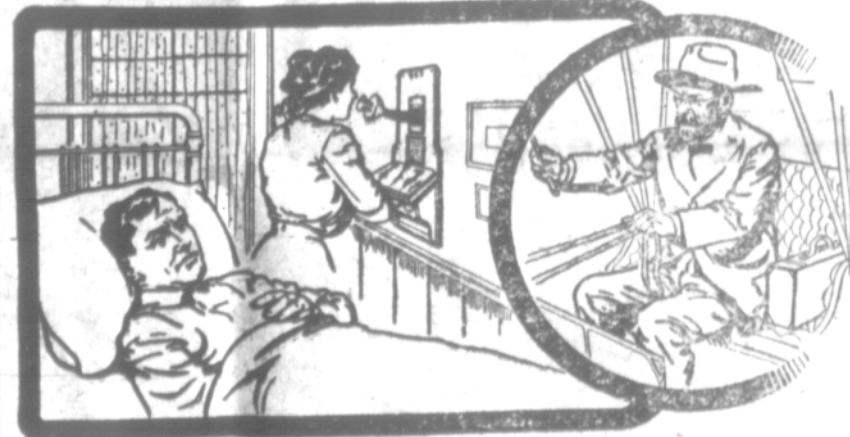

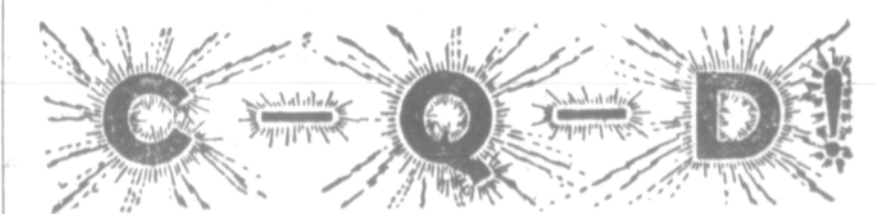
