Massachusetts Congressman Who Helped Canadian Reciprocity.



BRIEF NEWS OF THE WEEK

As a result of complaints made by steamship companies, Congress will be asked to remove the wreck of the sunken *Merimac* from the mouth of Santiago harbor.

A seventy-story hospital exclusively for the treatment of measles is to be built in New York City this summer at a cost of \$275,000.

The Russian government has asked the duma to vote \$60,000,000 for the construction of four battleships by 1915.

Because of the attacks on the church by popular magazines, the first presidency of the Mormon Church forbade the proposed visit of the tabernacle choir to New York next fall.

Followers of boxing throughout California are rejoicing over a report that the legislature would recommend 20-round bouts in the state.

The Colorado Senate adopted a resolution requesting President Taft to call an extra session of Congress to correct "known inequalities" of the tariff law. Democrats voted for and Republicans voted against the measure.

At a meeting of the San Francisco Labor Council, resolutions denouncing the government of President Diaz of Mexico, and endorsing the insurrectionary movement in that country, were adopted.

The proposal to construct a great international highway between New York and Montreal has received the approval of representatives of the principal municipalities on both sides of the boundary line.

New York is the largest Catholic archdiocese in the world, according to figures recently given out. One-seventh of the 14,600,000 Catholics in the United States are under the jurisdiction of Archbishop Farley, the exact number credited to New York being 2,750,000.

About 2000 delegates, representing practically every Presbyterian church in the United States, attended the fourth annual convention of the Presbyterian Brotherhood of America at St. Louis this week.

NEWS OF NOTED PERSONS

Pope Pius has virtually recovered from his attack of influenza.

Andrew Carnegie has offered to establish a hero fund of \$100,000 in Denmark.

The salary of Dublin's Lord Mayor-elect John J. Farrell, a news dealer, has been cut by the corporation from \$18,000 to \$8,000 a year.

Mrs. De Gogorza, sister-in-law of Emilio De Gogorza, the opera baritone, at her home in Brooklyn, said that her brother-in-law would marry Mrs. Emma Eames next July.

Dr. B. F. Roller of Seattle was seriously injured at Omaha after 25 minutes of wrestling in the second bout of a match with Jess Westerguard of Des Moines.

It is reported that the probable head of the Missouri Pacific to succeed George J. Gould would be Julius Kruttschnitt, present vice-president of the Harriman lines, in charge of maintenance and operation.

The taking of testimony in the case of Miss Anita Beatrice Turnbull, seeking a daughter's share in the Baldwin millions, which began on December 12 last, ended at Los Angeles.

Benj. F. Thomas, postmaster of Omaha, is charged with serious violations of the civil service law in a complaint sent to the civil service commission by Dan W. Tiltonson, a letter carrier.

By invitation of the Royal Aero Club of Great Britain, Glenn H. Curtiss, the noted American aviator, will take his hydro-aeroplane to England to demonstrate its ability to rise from and alight upon the water.

ANNEXATION TALK IS BAD FOR TREATY

Resentment of Canadians May Jeopardize the Reciprocity Measure.

Ottawa, Ont.—The continued talk of annexation, kept alive by the opposition journals, is causing resentment in Canada, according to some of the leading supporters of the government, and may jeopardize the reciprocity measure now before Parliament.

While the Liberals have accepted the message of President Taft to Mr. McCall as the true sentiment at Washington, a feeling that has been aroused in the dominion cannot be ignored, and it is understood that Sir Wilfrid Laurier will make a statement which it is asserted will set at rest forever the idea that annexation of Canada by the United States is possible.

It is declared by government supporters that the reciprocity plan is popular throughout Canada and would produce material results. But the sentimental feeling overshadows it, and the suggestion that the agreement is the first step toward depriving Canada of autonomy is resented.

Rock Pile for Industrial Workers. Fresno, Cal.—In preparation for the threatened invasion of 160 members of the Industrial Workers of the World, who are en route to this place and are stormbound at Steinman, Oregon, Fresno authorities established a rockpile at the county jail and put 16 members of the I. W. W. to hard labor.

Secret Societies Merge.

Denver.—The Ancient Order of United Workmen of Colorado perfected a merger with a fraternal beneficiary society known as the Americans, with headquarters in San Francisco, and branches in Idaho, Oregon, Washington and California.

MEXICAN TROOPS IN BATTLE WITH REBELS

Mexico City.—Reports reaching here tell of a fierce battle between insurgents and Federal troops at San Juan de Gaudelupe, the rebels finally retreating with 15 dead and 25 wounded. The Federal loss is not stated.

Francisco Madero, provisional president of the revolutionists, is reported to be rapidly moving on Chihuahua, and the government is planning to rush more troops to the city.

El Paso, Tex.—General Navarro, at the head of 1000 Federal troops, is camped on the trail of Francisco Madero, provisional president of the Mexican revolutionary government, in the hills south of Gaudelupe.

Fighting between the insurgent forces and the Federal troops is reported to the southeast of Casas Grande, Chihuahua, where the Mexican colonies are located. The number of dead and wounded cannot be ascertained, owing to the fact that the Mexican Northwest telegraph line is out of commission, having been cut by the insurgents.

REFERENDUM ON SUFFRAGE

Oregon Legislature Resolves to Submit Question to Electors in 1912.

Salem, Ore.—Besides endorsing the woman suffrage amendment, the late legislature adopted resolutions submitting to the electors of the state in the general election in November, 1912, five proposed amendments to the state constitution. Principal among these is one annulling the single tax amendment adopted by the people in the last election.

Of the other four amendments to be voted upon, two are companion amendments to the anti-single tax measure, one provides for the office of Lieutenant-Governor, and the other requires a majority of all votes cast in the election before an amendment to the state constitution submitted to the people shall become effective.

Investigate Reef Decision.

Sacramento.—The rules committee of the Senate and Assembly, in joint session, voted to begin an investigation of the Reef decision, in accordance with the request of the Supreme Court.

Russian Suffragists Congratulate.

Olympia, Wash.—A memorial from the council of the Russian Women's Suffrage League of St. Petersburg, congratulating the State of Washington upon the adoption of the woman suffrage amendment to the state constitution last November was received by the legislature.

NEWS PARAGRAPHS FROM OTHER CITIES IN OREGON

The Rogue River Valley Fruit and Produce Association, after its first year's business, is ready to declare a dividend of 20 per cent.

Discouraged by continued ill health, Mae Vivian Weaver, of Portland, aged 27, shot herself through the heart with a 32-caliber revolver. Death was almost instantaneous.

The body of Frank Hutton, aged 24, was found in the Powder River near Rainier. Coroner West held an inquest and the verdict was that the drowning was accidental.

Pearl Allen, a quarter-breed Indian girl, is in the custody of the officers at Klamath Falls, charged with robbing boxes in the local postoffice. The girl is but 13 years old.

The work of extending the Clatsop county taxes on the 1910 roll has been completed by County Clerk Clinton. The total amount of the tax is \$387,970.91 or \$53,886.87 more than the total of the 1909 roll, which was \$334,084.04.

Reduced rates to the Portland Rose Festival have been granted by all lines in the northwest and their eastern connections in spite of the failure of the transcontinental passenger association to take action at its Chicago meeting.

One of the biggest real estate deals ever recorded at Roseburg was consummated when a big acreage of some of the most valuable land in the immediate vicinity of the city was sold. The land consists of 550 acres. The price paid for the land was \$100,000.

An agent of the Oregon Trunk has been in the vicinity of Fort Klamath for several days filing notices on the owners of land on the Klamath Indian reservation for a right-of-way through their lands. This apparently means that this road is going to rush things the coming summer.

The conference committee on the Indian appropriation bill has agreed to Senator Chamberlain's amendment appropriating \$50,000 for continuing the construction of an irrigation project at Modoc Point, on the Klamath reservation, but cut down the ultimate cost of this project to \$155,000.

The bodies of three of the victims of the gasoline schooner *Oshkoeh* disaster were found, one at Columbia Beach, one at Gearhart Park and one at Holladay. The bodies were identified as the bodies of William R. Deane, part owner and engineer on the craft, Charles Larson and Gus Chibberg, two of the sailors.

Representative Ellis was notified that the treasury department will purchase a public building site at The Dalles immediately north of the court house, at the corner of Union and Second streets. This property is owned by Waco county and is offered for \$14,000. There is an appropriation of \$80,000 for building and site.

Twenty-two towns, with a total population of 3000, with a distributive area containing 40,000 people, will be thrown open by means of a daily train service on the Oregon Trunk Railway on March 1. Many of these towns are new places on the map, some of them having been in existence only a year or two, awaiting the arrival of the Oregon Trunk.

The city council of Medford has called a special election for March 2, for the purpose of amending section 72 of the city charter, concerning bond issues, and adding an amendment providing for the issuance of \$30,000 worth of bonds to provide for the improvement of the present water system and to pay for a portion of the sewerage system already installed.

A tract situated in Tillamook county on the line of the Pacific Railway & Navigation Company, bearing 50,000,000 feet of timber, was sold by E. T. Davies, the owner, to a syndicate, in which J. N. Bramhall, of the Bramhall Logging Company, of Portland, and C. A. Hollenbeck and associates of Manhattan, Kansas, are interested. The consideration was \$120,000.

That Madras is at last coming into its own is signified by the fact that the shepherds of Crook county have stated that that city will be made the shipping point for their wool products this year. This will mean that probably 2,000,000 pounds of wool will be sent to the factories through Madras, and it will be made the headquarters of the many wool buyers who annually visit central Oregon to purchase its product of fleeces.

In appropriating \$1,250,000 for advertising Oregon and other states in the west and northwest, the Union Pacific and Southern Pacific systems break all records in the amount annually spent in the exploitation of a single enterprise. While other states will share in the benefits from this remarkable advertising campaign, Oregon probably will reap the greatest harvest in the influx of people from other parts of the country and the increased interest that the outside world will take in the state.
