It is the understanding that Senator Jonathan Bunch of Oregon, in the course of a lecture in Boston, is to launch the presidential boom of La Follette and make an effort to capture the New England delegation to the national convention for him in a speech there today.

Congressman Lafferty has addressed letters to all congressmen from the Pacific New West, urging a conference for the formulation of some united plan to aid the various measures brought before the next session of vital interest to their states. Among the measures mentioned in the letter is state against federal control of forests, opening the Columbia to Nelson, elimination of agricultural lands from forests, and public land surveys.

The Jingo Rumors Lie.

March 22d President Taft invited Baron Uchida, the Japanese ambassador, to a conference at the White House, which set at rest the irresponsible stories that have been published to the effect that the army maneuvers in Texas and California are in a vague way directed at Japan. At their meeting, Taft told the ambassador that the reports were scarcely worth denying, but said he desired to set them at rest for all time. The president asked Baron Uchida to communicate these views direct to Japan. Mr Taft has been greatly annoyed by the persistent reports that Japan had negotiated a secret agreement with Mexico for a coaling station on the Pacific coast and that the United States was menacing Mexico as a protest. Denials from the Japanese embassy and the ambassador himself as to the coaling station story, as well as denials from the state department, as to any connection of Japan with the maneuvers, have failed to stop reports which the president regards malicious.

The expressiveness of the English language as shown in the hundred fine shadings of the words: "What's yours?" is no longer heard in Tacoma.

The Indiana legislature is considering a bill to make voting compulsory; but can a man be made a patriot by legislation? They had a different method in Adams county, Ohio.

A miners' strike in the south and another threatened in Canada, an express drivers' strike in New York, the announcement that Russians are mobilizing on the Chinese frontier and that noise and fury is unabated in Mexico calls attention to the fact that over the face of the earth this sunny month of spring there is considerable needless enmity and discord.

The unofficial peace societies throughout the world number nearly 600. A few flourish in Japan, China, Australasia, Africa and South America, but most are found in Europe and the United States. There are about 175 peace societies including branches in France, 85 in Germany, 70 in England, 50 in Sweden and 35 in Italy. In the United States have 63 as nearly as can be ascertained.

There seems to be an epidemic of resignation on the part of foreign cabinets. The French ministry resigned the other day; now the example is followed by Italy, Russia and Mexico, and the ultimate cause in each case was the general dissatisfaction on the part of the people. In spite of the many forms of government scattered over the face of mother earth, from republics to limited monarchies, the masses of the people seem to be having more to say in the administration of affairs.

Invoking the referendum on the University and Agricultural College appropriations would hold these appropriations up, and that is about all; the voters, as before, would not register a majority negative vote. The people of Oregon are too much in favor of the cause of education to knock the news to go east that Oregon cannot maintain, in the proper manner, the two leading educational institutions in the state; and it is to be regretted that it has been reported that even an attempt to cripple them has been made.

Years ago the appointment of a minister as president of Harvard university called forth the explanation that he was selected because he knew more about hell and the devil than most men. Such knowledge was perhaps of more value a few generations ago than today, but the custom of selecting members of the ministry as university and college heads still goes on. The latest to come to notice is the proposed appointment of Dr E. L. House, pastor of the First Congregational church, as president of Spokane college. It has not been announced that Dr House knows of Old Eric and his habitation, but the fact that before he was a minister he played football at Harvard suggests that he would be a good man for the job.

Three Fourths Current Tax is Paid.

Sheriff Freeman and Deputy J. C. McKean have had a strenuous time the first half of March taking in the money coming to them as the tax collectors for Sherman county. The tax roll for this year calls for \$100,096.22, and they have now collected a total of \$68,341.71 leaving a balance of \$31,754.51, which will be less when those who avail themselves of the half payment clause to stop penalty and interest, which expires April 3d this year; pay their half of the tax now due. The sheriff's office has furnished the tax collection figures on all who paid in full and secured rebates. Credit Association Organized.

Messrs Lindeman and Smith of The Dalles have organized the Sherman County Business Men's Association in connection with The Dalles Credit Association and as a branch of the Colonial Mercantile Agency of St. Louis. Although composed of business firms of the county it is of more benefit to the customers of the different members than otherwise, as in its working it will make collections easier to both the customer and the merchant, and nearly, if not quite, eliminate the party who makes a practice of running accounts with little idea of paying.

Generally such an association is looked upon with suspicion by those using credit, but under the system soon to be put in vogue in Sherman county a different and more harmonious method of effecting a settlement will be instituted than the present method of settling with the banks of the county.
