Mrs Eugene Garlick, well known former resident of this city, was probably fatally injured at the St. Johns woolen mills last week. While removing a belt from a flywheel her hand was caught and she was dragged across the floor, sustaining a fracture of the skull and a broken arm; when picked up she was unconscious. She was rushed to Good Samaritan hospital, where it was stated that her chances for recovery were slight. Mr Garlick has a husband and two sons. At last accounts we have she was still alive.

It won't be long before the name of your farm is known and people will be calling for your products. The town merchant advertises, and the farmer can just as well advertise his butter and eggs and produce.

The big woolen mills at San Jose, which dominated the woolen goods interests of the Pacific coast for half a century, are being dismantled and relegated to the scrap heap. Its Roland in the trusts which dominate trade even more arbitrarily than its history of the past reveals. It was almost as well known as the old Mission Woolen Mills, whose blankets were famous around the world. The shutting down of this mill at San Jose was due to the influence of the greater trust, which now controls marketing of all woolen goods and no matter how fine the output of the California mills, buyers could not be secured for it.

Too much artesian water in the WallaWalla country is troublesome. The Kelly well, the 29th one near the city, is running to waste and defies every effort to plug it. The water is now flowing 48 inches high out of an open 10-inch pipe yielding 3,000 gallons a minute, a lower flow than any artesian well yet struck there. The largest Blacklock well flowed but 44 inches high out of an open eight-inch pipe, or 2,200 gallons a minute. The Kelly well is increasing in volume and is ruining the adjoining field. Much speculation is indulged in by those who are watching the progress of artesian development to the outcome of the Kelly project. It is said by some that the well is gradually emptying the artesian basin in that immediate district.
