Scientific Savior.

Among the 120,000 soldiers mobilized for the Spanish-American war in 1898 there were in their camps at Chicamauga and elsewhere 20,000 typhoid cases and a death rate of 7 percent in the first eight weeks.

Note this contrast. Among the 18,000 soldiers now in camp at San Antonio, thanks to typhoid inoculation and sanitary precaution, but one solitary case of typhoid has been developed, and no death has ensued.

The health standard of the troops in camp is actually higher than in the quarters and barracks whence they came.

Not only typhoid, but yellow fever, cholera, bubonic plague, beri-beri, and other scourges of the tropics, have lost much of their deadly force through the courageous and self-exposing work of the modern surgeon.

President Taft has ample justification for the eulogy he paid last week to the work of army and civil physicians since the bad days of 1898.

When the history of this decade comes to be written it will be found that a complete re-statement of values in events will be recorded; the triumphs of peace will be dwelt on as far outweighing in importance the conquest of territory through the means of war; lives saved will be contrasted with lives sacrificed.

The statue of history will be created to the conqueror of death, folded his hands, with "it is written," or "kismet," the decree of fate; to inspire his absolute claim.

The accidental, be it Teuton or Latin; was credited with the spirit of revolt, prompting to the meeting and overcoming of disaster.

The history of Japan, however, for the past 40 years, has been the lie to the inevitableness of this distinction; modern surgery and medicine in Japan has reached the standard of any occidental nation, even the most advanced.

So it is proven that scientific knowledge can overcome radical features; the whole civilized world is kin.

The debt of the times to the student of advancing and exact knowledge in every sphere of life is each day more fully recognized, and the scientific savior is coming into his own.
