Charley Garlick of St. Johns, is here for the harvest, and may decide to relocate here and open a jewelry and watch repair business in the building known as Dorcas hall, property belonging to his mother. We were glad to learn from Charley that his mother has about recovered from what was nearly fatal injuries in an accident that befell her last fall at the St. Johns woolen mills.

Fred Allen, a representative of the E. M. F. Northwest Company was a Moro visitor on the 18th. The rear axle and gearing upon one of their fine cars recently sold here was giving the owner some trouble; the E. M. F. Co. replaced both with new, without expense to the owner, and made a very satisfied customer out of a somewhat dissatisfied purchaser. This is what may be called fair treatment.

N W Eastwood has completed a filing on about 29 acres of land in The Dalles, claiming that title to this tract has never passed from the United States government. The tract takes in the Umatilla house, Columbia hotel, O-W-R, & N. repair shops, the Sisters school and several dwellings. The whole thing was threshed out 40 years ago, during the life time of Senator Vic Trevitt, Col Gates and Judge O Savage.

So rigid is the quarantine now in force at New York that 700 originally booked to take passage on the steamship, San Giorgio, but were disembarked at Naples by the officials of the company.

MOUNTAIN SUMMER OUTING

Wasco Party Return From a Trip to Mount Vernon Hot Springs.

C H Howell and family and V H Smith and family, who left for Mt Vernon Hot Springs, by auto June 13th, have returned after a most delightful outing in the Blue Mountains. The speedometer registered 170 miles from Wasco. The Springs are situated 14 miles from Canyon City and 12 miles from John Day.

There are three hot springs that range in temperature from 108 to 121 degrees, with a daily flow of 25,000 gallons. The water is strongly mineral but not to the extent of being disagreeable to taste or smell.

After a bath one feels an exhilaration that is impossible to get in any other way. The camping facilities are fine; one can get tents, beds, stoves and fresh meat in abundance and vegetables of all kinds. There is a swimming tank 30 feet by 50 feet ranging in depth from 3 feet to 7 feet. A commodious brick hotel where one can find rest and quiet. There are some splendid fishing streams where the speckled beauties lie in wait for the luckless worm or unwary fly, one stream in particular being noted for its abundance of Dolly Varden trout.

The roads are solid and free from dust and in the most places fair traveling and as good as one could expect in a mountain region. On the return trip the John Day was followed as far as Dayville, thence to Mitchell, then north to Condon, crossing the John Day again at Twickenham, and home by the way of McDonald ferry.

To Keep Cabbage Fresh.

Frequently only half a cabbage is required at a time. To keep the remainder fresh, wrap it in some of the loose leaves and afterwards in damp paper. The old-time swimming hole in Grass Valley canyon, on land owned by H W Strong, is this year more popular than for 16 years past. All the boys now, and some parents who were boys in the rainy season of '93, patronize the hole this year. It was at one time a popular place for baptisms, when men and women were converted to Christianity by gospel talkers of various denominations, incidents of a long time ago. Mr Strong has improved the hole by the construction of a concrete dam which conserves the water which he uses for irrigation purposes.

Dense smoke covered the earth in this division of Oregon Tuesday morning; coming, as is supposed, from forest fires in the Clear creek district, southeast of Estacada where fire was raging with a five mile front. Several large fires in other portions of the state, and in Clark county, Washington, were reported. Hundreds of men are fighting flames in various parts of the Pacific New West, where thousands of acres of valuable timber have been destroyed, corporate and private property burned and hundreds of persons forced to flee for their lives.
