The Farm Train Scheduled.

Schedules for the movement of the farming demonstration train of the O-W. R. & N. Co., through Morrow, Gilliam, Sherman and Crook counties, in conjunction with the Oregon Agricultural College and Experiment Station have been completed and provide for stops at 13 enterprising cities and towns. The train will leave Portland Sunday night, October 29th, and will make the following stops in Sherman county:

Wednesday, Nov. 1st.—Grass Valley, 8 o'clock to 11.30 a. m.—Moro, 12 m. to 2.15 p. m.—Wasco, 3 o'clock to 6 p. m.—R. B. Miller, traffic manager of the O-W. R. & N. Co., who has sent a number of demonstration trains into other parts of the state and who believes thoroughly in the agricultural possibilities of the territory through which the train will operate, has been working for the past few weeks to equip this one with all the appliances necessary to give the farmers who visit it valuable information, that will assist them in the development of their land.

The following instructors from the O. A. C. will be on board and will discuss with the farmers any question that pertains to soil culture and scientific crop raising:

Dr. James Withycombe, director; Prof. Scudder, Prof. Kent, Prof. Dryden, Prof. R. L. Potter, Robert Withycombe, superintendent eastern Oregon Experiment Station; Supt. Moro Dry Farm Station; Orran Beatty traveling agricultural advisor.

H. E. Thompson, of Virginia, began school in district 25, known as the German settlement, on the 19th. He was accompanied to Moro Wednesday, by S. B. Holmes to arrange for a transfer of the teachers certificate from his native state to Oregon.

The expected has happened and the Portland fair and livestock exposition association has passed up to a receiver, to liquidate \$132,200 indebtedness with a cash asset of \$222.35 and a tract of real estate valued at \$140,000, but mortgaged for more than its worth. Our old time friend G. A. Westgate was made receiver.

Dr. O. J. Goffin was appointed by Gov. West to represent this division of Oregon at the dry farming congress at Colorado Springs this week, but he was obliged to decline because of the pressing demands upon him both at home and in Portland, by a few patients who cannot be neglected.

E. E. Lytle's Tillamook-Portland Railway will be thrown open to all kinds of business November 1. This new railroad is a subsidiary company of the S. P. Ry. the articles of incorporation of which company prevent it from engaging in the construction of branch lines. The road has been under construction for more than two years, at a cost of about \$5,000,000.

The Ladies' Aid Society of the M. E. Church at Wasco, held their annual festival last Saturday. In the evening a concert was given, the singers being dressed in costumes of the times of George Washington. The entire proceeding was a grand success, highly appreciated by the crowds in attendance. The revenue from tables, booths and concert, netted nearly 200 dollars.
