Casting bread upon the waters and having it returned to the sower is suggested by the experience on Snake river near Lewiston; smart folks thereabouts are turning riverbars into fruitful orchards. Some day somebody will raise 30 bushels of wheat to the acre from bare rocks seeded and irrigated.

The proposal to restrict the issuance of injunctions would, if enacted into law, tend to do away with the abuse that has grown up like barnacles on the functions of American courts. There seems to be but little room for doubt that the experience of this country has demonstrated that the restraining order has too often been made a legal technicality to interfere with the securing of equity.

Representative Nelson of Wisconsin, proposes that congress establish a bureau for research in the science and art of government. Its work would be the compilation and indexing of all legislation in the world and the phrasing of public bills. Such a bureau was established in Wisconsin years ago and has rendered valuable service. So does the New York bureau of municipal research.

Nietzsche claimed that without war the world would stagnate and lose itself in materialism. The Encyclopedia Britannica exposes the inexcusable baselessness of Nietzsche's claim. It states that America has been the pioneer of the view that peace is the normal condition of mankind. The unprecedented progress that America has made in its 120 years of peace as against 16 years of war discredits the first half of Nietzsche's claim, and the fundamental idealism of American life the second part.

The statue of John Paul Jones, the first great commander of the American navy, molded to show him as he stood on the deck of the Bon Homme Richard in its fight with the Serapis off the coast of England more than 120 years ago, was unveiled in Washington city on the 17th. Thus, after more than a century of apparent indifference, the nation honors the memory of the man who spread terror throughout England when she was mistress of the sea, and who taught the world that the 13 colonies had a right to a place among nations.

Something to be Cut Out.

This column has frequently made remarks similar to these from a higher and more impressive source, that of a New York supreme court justice, W O Howard: "There are too many laws, too many courts, too many appeals, too many technicalities. Nobody knows the law, nobody can know the law. In these days a law library would fill a barn. Thousands of thick volumes constitute the written law. A dozen volumes would suffice. The citizen cannot know the law; the lawyers cannot comprehend the law; the judges cannot interpret the law." Judge Ridden, one of the eminent jurists in Canada, in a recent authorized interview said: "I have been at the bar or on the bench about 30 years, and never, even in murder cases, have I seen more than half an hour consumed in getting a jury. I have never but once known even a murder case to last as much as four days. Some time ago I went to hold the London, Ont., assizes. There were to be tried four criminal cases, one of murder, one of manslaughter, one of serious embezzlement, and one of less importance, and 11 civil cases. At the same time I opened my assize in London, a court in Detroit, Mich., only a few hours along the railroad, began to get a jury in a murder case. My four prisoners were on their way to the penitentiary and seven of the 11 civil cases had been disposed of before half the jury had been got together in Detroit. Canadian criminal law is codified in the simplest possible form and there is not an appeal in 50 cases." Comment does not appear to be necessary.

January 13th, 1913, will be the 50th anniversary of emancipation and congress has appropriated \$250,000 to celebrate the event. President Lincoln was extremely deliberate about the issuance of this proclamation; it took him a long time to make up his mind; he gave ample notice of what he was about to do, and his purpose, after having made up his mind, was steadfast and true. No more appropriate jubilee celebration could possibly be conceived than this 50th celebration of the issuance of the emancipation proclamation, and congress does well to inaugurate the celebration by an appropriation that will enable the event to be celebrated with a fervor and jubilation worthy of the issuance of the great proclamation which is to be commemorated.

Senator Bourne credits the press of Oregon with having brought about his defeat. Other factors contributed slightly to this result, he admits, but the principal cause of his downfall was opposition of newspapers in this state. If Mr Bourne could have seen the streets full of his stuff franked to Moro, after the mails were delivered daily, and we presume it was the same at other offices in the state judging from the returns of the primary election, he might corks his wrath. No man in public life whose acts subjected him to just public criticism ever had a good opinion of the newspapers. It is not surprising to find Jonathan scratching his "itch" spot.

We have no more grounds for objecting to an investment of Japanese capital at Magdalena bay than we have for objecting to investments of British and German capital in other parts of Mexico. But we have just as much cause for objecting to a cession or lease of Mexican territory to the Japanese as to any other foreign government. The Monroe Doctrine applies with as much force to Japan as to any European monarch. If the Japanese enterprise at Magdalena bay is a mere cloak for a Japanese coaling or naval station, we should state our objections and proceed at once to enforce them.

We are glad to recognize the hand of Drake C O'Reilly in the latest move for recognition of Astoria to the commercial status due to her and The Inland Empire, and we also welcome Col. Sidney Dell back to the place he once filled so well as a writer on this topic. Mr Dell is a resident of Los Angeles but is yet in touch with old Oregon.
