After 24 hours deliberation they brought in an acquittal verdict. This case established a record for Sherman county in the number of men excused before the jury was secured and the length of time the jury was out.

Every weed destroyed now will cut out so much less work another year; like the fly, weeds must be exterminated to conserve a more profitable crop on the farm; and every city like Moro should pass an ordinance which will give the marshal complete control over every street and neglected lot, to destroy weeds at the expense of the property; a good farmer once said that he never lost any time trying to kill weeds along the road side, but tried to keep his fields clean. It is necessary to do both, for enough weed seeds mature along the road side to seed the whole neighborhood; it looks better, besides it pays to mow the road ways; weeds take plant food and water from the soil that is needed to make the crop good, and certain weeds poison the soil so that crops do not do so well, because of the poisonous effect of such weeds; if you must have weeds on the farm grow cow peas so that you may get some good out of them.
