This is a little more than one-quarter of the state's area. Every county in the state has its quota and while most of the land is far from the larger towns, much of it is fertile and will be productive when tilled.

The diplomas were then distributed to the various members of the classes, and all received the congratulations of their friends.

The highways are just grand for travel of all kinds, and he was delayed but half a day at one time by rain which, as they were under cover, was greatly enjoyed; they had to detour about 30 miles to cross a bridge, on account of high water in Snake river, but as the detour took them through Lewiston and Clarkston feel that the extra travel was well paid for. At Clarkston they were rewarded by seeing some of the finest irrigated gardens and orchards to be seen anywhere; a clean, beautiful little city, with good streets, lawns, shade trees, blooming roses, neat homes, and great wealth of cherries, just ripening, made him feel the uselessness of looking any farther for anything better, but when told the price of land was compelled to move on and leave Clarkston for those with longer and better filled purses.

The Harney County Land Grant. Blue Mountain Eagle: Not a great many of the covered-wagon homeseekers seem to locate in central Oregon; they make the circuit by way of Bend to Burns and Vale to Burns, then exit via Canyon. The Central Oregon country is a great and good country but when the homeseeker arrives he finds that a few individuals, often organized into a company or corporation, beat them to it and own everything in sight, water and all.
