OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Events Occurring Throughout
the State During the Past
Week.

Indict Roseburg Brewing Co.
Roseburg.—The grand jury has returned indictments charging the Roseburg Brewing & Ice company and the brewery manager and wagon driver with violating the local option law by selling real beer. This is a result of the raid of July 3, when the sheriff and deputies raided Roseburg's nine soft drink stands and seized kegs of beer from each. A keg was also taken from the brewery and the brewery wagon. The contents of the kegs were later analyzed and said to contain real beer.

Line Will be Rushed.
Eugene.—Immediate construction of the Eugene-Morrow section of the Portland, Eugene & Eastern, work to begin within two weeks, says the promise made here by Robert Strahorn, general manager of the Southern Pacific company's electrical properties in the Willamette valley. With favorable conditions cars should be running from Eugene to Corvallis within 50 days.

TUBERCULOSIS EXHIBIT ON
Warfare on "White Plague" Subject of 7-Day Meeting.

Balem.—An exhibition which is attracting wide attention here opened Friday for the first time on the Pacific coast, the National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis opened with meetings and the exhibits at the armory. The exhibit is supplemented by addresses. Further meetings of this character will mark the seven days' program which has been arranged.

W. L. Cooper, of New York, is in charge of the exhibit which is being held under the auspices of the Salem citizens' committee. The exhibit is absolutely gratuitous in every way and its sole object is to advance the warfare which is being waged against the "white plague."

Mr. Cooper says he hopes to hold an exhibit of this character in Portland, but how soon arrangements may be made is still uncertain.

The tuberculosis exhibit itself is attracting a great deal of attention. Models, maps, charts and many other features illustrative of tuberculosis, its cause, effect and disastrous results from the disease are included in the exhibit.

Bank Director Wins Case.
Astoria.—The circuit court jury in the case of Frank B. Godfrey, of the Bank of Seaside, against B. F. Barich, one of the directors of the defunct institution, returned a verdict for the defendant. This action was brought to recover \$59,275.86, the full amount of the bank's net indebtedness at the time it failed, with interest at 6 per cent from November 10, 1910.

Dredge Will go to Gray's Harbor.
Marshfield.—The government dredge Oregon is to be taken from Coos Bay to Gray's Harbor as soon as the government project in this harbor is completed which will be some time in September. Engineer Leefe, who is in charge of the work here, has received orders to that effect from Major Morrow, of Portland.

BIG PLANT IS PLANNED
Modern Machinery Factory to be Established Soon.

Portland.—A modern plant containing eight buildings, with an aggregate floor space of more than 400,000 square feet, will be established at the new town of Armstrong, 24 miles south of the city on the Oregon Electric by the Armstrong Manufacturing company. The plant will cost \$151,000.

The company will manufacture 46 different types of machines for use in lumbering and various branches of the industry. The special machinery to be turned out will be used in sawmills, box factories, furniture factories, pulp mills, woodenware shops and pattern shops.

The company has operated an experimental plant in Portland the past six years and during that time has turned out special types of machinery that are now used in 14 countries of the world.

It is planned to begin construction on the plant in about 60 days. When in full operation the plant will give employment to about 300 men.

Waves Caused by Hail at Baker.
Baker, Or.—Thousands of dollars damage was done by the largest and most peculiar hail storm in this part of the country in years. The greatest damage was done in the country, the storm going northward, although gardens and orchards in the city were badly cut.

KILLS RABID DOG BY CHOKING HIM.

Young Man Saves Children From
Big Newfoundland.

Mary C. Edis, seventeen years old, of Brooklyn, saved a big Newfoundland dog by choking him and preventing him from attacking school children. According to the New York Press. The animal was trotting at the mouth. So weakened was the youth by his encounter that he fell over the dog's body in a dazed condition. He was helped to his feet and led to the office of a physician where he was treated for dangerous bites on the left forearm and hands. Edis said afterward he thought several times the Newfoundland would get his teeth in his (Edis') throat.

The children on their way home from school stopped in front of the yard in which the big dog was confined and tormented the animal by waving their arms, yelling and tossing pebbles at him.

him. Again and again the infuriated dog sprang toward them to the full length of the chain that bound him to his kennel. Suddenly the brute was making one of its springs a link broke, and the dog, a section of the chain still hanging from his collar, darted toward the terrified youngsters. Harry Edis, who was passing in time to see the dog jump the fence, ran to the yard in pursuit of the little ones. He seized the big, woolly creature like a football tackle and seized the animal by the throat.

Over and over Edis and the dog rolled on the sidewalk. Then Edis freed himself, staggered to one side and kicked the snarling animal in the head. That felled the dog a second time, and the youth seized his collar, before he could spring at him again. Before he could get his fingers about the Newfoundland's throat, however, the animal twisted his head and ripped open his left forearm to the bone.

Although he was bleeding freely, the boy clutched the brute's neck in a desperate grasp and held on, despite the powerful writhings of the dog, which was fully as heavy as he. Once, for a few seconds, Edis lost his grip, and it was then he thought he would feel the animal's fangs in his throat. He recovered himself, however, and pressed the dog's windpipe with each telling effect that its struggles gradually lessened and it died.

Teak Two Hours to Cope Bear.
Six men stood about the cage of a Russian brown bear in the Bronx zoo and tried to coax the beast into a crate for shipment. The coaxing was done with long poles that reached to the farthest corners of the cage and the nice red, raw pieces of pig's head which lay enticingly near the door of the crate, says the New York Times.

"Look out, Jake!" shouted a fellow keeper to the men holding the rope that held open the cage door. The bear was in the nick of time, for he had seized a loose iron bar in his mouth and was about to use it to smash his way out of the cage when he was held back by the ropes.

From the time that the struggle began until the bear was securely fastened to the cage and slushed at the keepers with the long iron bar constantly. There was no rest for him or the men. For two hours the bear tore at the bars and seized them from the men as fast as they tried to put them in place in the front of the crate after he was inside.

Fights a She Bear in His Barn.
To enter a barn and unexpectedly run up against a she bear and fight her with a pitchfork was the experience of Farmer R. H. Wills near Pleasant Valley, Wash.

Mr. Wills went to the barn to do his chores and upon entering was confronted by a large black bear and two cubs.

Seizing a pitchfork, he attacked the old bear and succeeded in inflicting several severe wounds, but the animal finally managed to get out the open door, and followed by the cubs, escaped to the woods.

A litter of small pigs kept in the barn attracted the animal.

BRIEF NEWS OF OREGON

President Taft has appointed E. P. Morelock to be postmaster at Walla Walla.

Dr. Paul Ritter, Switzerland's minister to the United States, visited Portland last week.

By a vote of almost five to one Bend voted bonds in the sum of \$80,000 for a sewer system for the city.

The union summer school of the Seventh Day Adventist teachers of the Pacific coast is in session in Portland.

Klamath Falls has a new industry in a tin and pall factory, which has just been started with a force of 15 workers.

The pack of salmon along the Columbia river is expected to show a decrease of 25 per cent of what it was a year ago.

Wolf hounds, chasing down wild coyotes around the park, will be added as a thriller to this year's roundup at Pendleton.

The question of the constitutional validity of Albany's midnight closing ordinance is to go to the supreme court of Oregon for decision.

Eighteen of the seniors of the University of Oregon just graduated, have accepted positions as teachers in the high schools of Oregon.

According to a statement prepared by State Treasurer Kay, there was a total of \$1,144,448.85 of state money in the depositories of the state on June 30.

Practically 150,000 fingerling trout from the Bonneville hatchery were brought to Portland to be distributed throughout the section for restocking the streams.

Owners of 25,000 of the 30,000 acres included in the west extension of the Unatilla project already have pledged their lands, virtually assuring the improvement by the government.

Dwelling houses were built in Portland during the 12 months or fiscal year ending June 30, at an average rate of 12.45 for every working day, or one completed house for every 37.4 minutes of the eight hour work day.

C. L. Houston of Astoria has a large force at work building four miles of railroad for the Cronsett Timber company, from tidewater near Knappa to tap the company's immense timber tract in what is known as the Big Creek district.

Through the Weeks' bill, passed for the purpose of protecting the headwaters of navigable streams, Oregon has received \$10,000 for forest fire protection. A force of 50 men under the state forester will be distributed in the timbered sections.

Silents homestead entrymen, whose cases had been held up by the general land office through the publishing some time ago of an alleged option of purchase of a large number of the silents, have been notified that the suspension order has been revoked.

Lane county socialists have nominated a complete county ticket and adopted a platform in which is advocated the abolition of the state senate, laying of income and inheritance tax, purchase by the state of all land sold for taxes, and opposition to all laws infringing the right of free speech.

J. C. Moreland, clerk of the supreme court, has announced that no cases will be set for the month of August and probably none will be heard until October 1, although there is a possibility of some cases being heard late in September. August will be vacation month for members of the supreme court.

Senator Bourne's amendments to the rivers and harbors bill appropriating \$700,000 for Cello falls, \$40,000 for Oregon slough, \$100,000 for Nehalem bay, and \$25,000 for preliminary plans to secure a 30 foot channel from Portland to the sea, were agreed to by the conference committee and the bill, carrying \$3,000,000, passed.

Results of great possibilities were reached when a settlement was agreed upon between the Pacific Live-stock company and a number of settlers around Burns. In a lawsuit involving the waters of Foley Slough, an arm of Silvies river which flows through the valley and upon which the success of many fine farms depends.

Master Fish Warden Clanton has written to Attorney-General Crawford asking whether the State Fish and Game Commission has a right to grant licenses to set fish traps and nets within three miles of the shore in the Pacific Ocean; and if it has this right whether it can enforce the open and closed season. While a formal opinion has not been furnished, it is the off-hand opinion of the office that the commission has this right.

After repeated failures in the courts to secure an adjudication of its water rights on the Malheur river, the Nevada Ditch company, through its president, C. W. Mallett, has petitioned the board of control for an adjudication of the rights on this stream. The funds for this kind of work have run low, and State Engineer Lewis declares that unless an appropriation is made for it by the next legislature it will probably be two or three years before water rights on this stream can be finally adjudicated.

Mrs. Hetty Green, America's richest woman, who is in her seventy-eighth year, was baptized a few days ago by an Episcopal minister of New York in order to prepare for confirmation as a member of the church.

Vice-President Sherman, who has been ill at his home in Union, N. Y., for several weeks, has decided, after consultation with leaders of the senate, to remain there the rest of the present session of congress.

Granville W. Mooney, ex-speaker of the Ohio assembly, has declined the post of assistant secretary to President Taft, to succeed Sherman P. Allen, of Vermont, who was nominated for assistant secretary of the treasury.

In the national typewriter contests at Spokane, held under the auspices of the National Commercial Teachers' Federation, Miss Florence E. Wilson of New York, copied 7819 words with 68 errors, from unfamiliar copy, breaking all world's records.

Sullen, unruly and a persistent disturber of prison discipline, J. B. McNamara, elder of the McNamara brothers, confessed dynamiters, has been placed in solitary confinement at San Quentin until he shows a willingness to conform to the laws of the prison.

Political News Bits

Headed by Speaker Clark, more than half the Democratic majority of the house made a complimentary call on Governor Woodrow Wilson.

Judge John C. Karel of Milwaukee, best known to the world at large as "Ike," the Wisconsin football player, has been nominated for governor by the Wisconsin Democratic convention.

At a conference between Colonel Roosevelt, George W. Perkins and Senator Dixon, it was decided that Roosevelt would remain in Oyster Bay until August 2, when he will depart for Chicago to attend the convention of the new party.

A. T. Rogers, Republican national committeeman from Wisconsin, appointed by National Chairman Hill as a member of the Taft national advisory committee, declares that he has informed Chairman Hill that he would be unable to serve. Republican political managers believe that Rogers' refusal to serve on the Taft committee indicates that Senator La Follette will support neither Taft nor Roosevelt in the coming campaign.
