OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Events Occurring Throughout the State During the Past Week.

Railroad Commission Is Busy.
Salem.—The state railroad commission is putting in a busy 10 days with the following hearings, starting with Monday: July 29—Hearing at The Dalles as to suspension of the fence law on the O. W. R. & N. along the main line of the Columbia. Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, three hearings at Baker—Sumpter Valley logging roads, brought by the Baker commercial club; Sumpter Valley valuation hearing and all rates on the Sumpter Valley brought on the commission's own motion; August 2—Two hearings at Vale—C. B. Smith against the Oregon Short Line, and A. B. Cox against the Oregon Short Line; August 5, at Kamela—Hearing as to loading facilities on the O. W. R. & N.; August 7, hearing at La Grande—C. A. Barrett and others as to fencing along the line of the Northern Pacific.

McCusker Announces Candidacy.
Portland.—Responding to the requests of friends in both the republican and democratic parties, including La Follette, Roosevelt and Taft republicans, Thomas McCusker has formally announced his candidacy as an independent republican for representative in congress from the third district.

CONTROL BOARD MENACED

Petition to Transfer Water Rights
Cases Threatens Body's Use.

Salem.—Should it be determined as the result of a petition which has been filed with the state engineer that the question of adjudication of water rights may be transferred from the state courts or the board of control to the federal courts, it will result in practically doing away with the efficiency of the board of control.

Hearing as to water rights on the Styvia river has been set for August 26. No provision is made in the state law for the federal court to assume jurisdiction, but the Pacific Livestock company, of San Francisco, declaring itself to be a foreign corporation, has filed a petition asking for a transfer to those courts.

Inasmuch as foreign owners have water rights on practically every stream in the state, should the petition be granted and the contention of the company hold good, it would give the possibility of throwing practically all water right disputes into the federal courts.

Roseburg Men Indicted.
Roseburg.—Charged with violating the local option law, Hyman; Wolfenberger, Roseburg's wealthiest resident; F. G. Miceil, ex-city attorney; Claud Cannon and W. H. Sykes, capitalists, were jointly indicted with the Roseburg Brewing & Ice company. The indicted men compose the officers and board of directors of the brewing company.

COUNTY COURT IS TARGET

Wasco Residents File Petition for Recall Election.

The Dalles.—Angered at the action of members of the county court in proceeding with the election of the new \$100,000 courthouse after they had failed to enjoy officials from going along with the work, the courthouse opponents filed petitions with County Clerk Angle demanding that a special election be called, when the voters of Wasco county will have a chance to say whether County Judge Lake, of this city, and Commissioners Stoughton, of Dufur, and Rooper, of Astoria, shall be recalled from office.

County court members have decided to oppose any attempt to call the proposed recall election. They will file an injunction restraining Clerk Angle from ordering the election on the ground that the recall law is not operative in Oregon, a point which has been raised by District Attorney Cameron, of Portland, and which is now pending a decision in the Oregon supreme court.

Union High School Wanted.

Eugene.—A petition has been filed with the county school superintendent asking that a special election be called to determine the question of establishing a union high school district, with the union high school to be erected at Lowell. Nine school districts are to be included in the high school district. This will make the ninth union high school for Lane county.

Albany Demands Are Light.

Albany.—All railroads running through this city will be required to place an arc light at the corner of every street over which their lines pass within the city limits, according to an ordinance which has been passed by the council.

NURSED TO HEALTH BY BANNIBAL TRIBE

Explorer Picked Up by Man Enters and Cared For.

Alcot Lange, a tall, fair haired young Dane, whose home is in Brooklyn, related recently at the University of Pennsylvania museum the story of his hazardous journey in the jungle of the upper Amazon and of his experience among the Manganomas cannibals, who treated him with surprising kindness and nursed him back to life after he had fallen unconscious in the heart of the jungle.

Lange was seven days without food of any kind after one of his companions had died of snake bite and the other of the tropical disease beriberi. He crawled on his hands and knees throughout the seventh night, and with the coming of the morning he realized that he was near a settlement, as he could hear the barking of dogs and the screaming of parrots. His strength was exhausted, however, and he would have died had he not been discovered by one of the Manganomas hunters.

"Accompanied by six natives, all employees of a large rubber estate," said Mr. Lange, "I started forth with my camera and other equipment to ex-

More the jungle of the upper Amazon. We progressed far into the interior, several hundred miles from our starting point, which is called Remata de Males (Culminating of Evil) and is itself 2,400 miles from the mouth of the Amazon.

Then the food gave out and Mr. Lange's companions died. Next came his story of days without food, followed finally by his becoming unconscious. "When I woke up," he said, "I was in a hammock in a large hut and a woman was standing by me feeding me some sort of broth. I spent two weeks among this tribe, and through their kindness I regained sufficient strength to make my way back with this assistance to my starting point."

"I soon learned that there were at least 275 other persons living in the one hut, which was circular and about forty feet high and 125 feet in diameter. There was a hole in the top for the smoke from the various fires to go through, and there was a single door about four feet high at one side, which was the only means of ingress or egress. The ventilation was abominable.

"The entire tribe lived in this one house. There was a chief who was absolute ruler, and all the other men were hunters. The women of the tribe were co-operative in the extreme. A hunter had supplied the daily wants of his family he had to give up the rest to other families at the direction of the chief.

"I cannot explain how he got the name, but the chief was called Benjamin. The women were scantily clad, and the men wore only headgear, excepting the chief, who had a belt of girdle. They were very sanitary, every one bathing twice a day. A very high standard of morality prevailed.

"If a youth wanted to marry a girl he had to get the consent of the chief. In order to do this he would have to carry a heavy log seven times around the hut. The girl was not consulted. The hunters were allowed to have only one wife, whom they could not discard, but the chief was allowed four or five. The women painted their faces with a beautiful scarlet and perfumed their bodies about once a week."—Philadelphia North American.

Out of Concrete Mixer Alive.

To come out of a concrete mixer alive after being caught by the machinery which was started when he was standing inside cleaning it, was the remarkable experience of Forch Deborra, an Italian laborer, thirty-four years old, whose home is in Cleveland and whose adventure is reported in the State Journal of Columbus, O., in which city it occurred. Deborra's left foot was almost crushed off, and the flesh was badly torn in his left groin.

Having misconstructed an order, Deborra climbed into the mixer to clean it. The engineer, not knowing Deborra was in the machine, started it. The man's screams attracted attention, and the machine was stopped. He was reported to a hospital, and his foot was amputated.

BRIEF NEWS OF OREGON

Astoria will hold the annual regatta on August 27, 28 and 29.

Nehalem will hold a big dahlia show the latter part of August.

President Taft has nominated Chas. E. Culbertson as postmaster of Clatskanie.

The annual session of the Coos County Training school will be held in Bandon, August 5-16, inclusive.

Albany's new filter plant, which civil engineers say is a very fine one, was officially opened Monday, July 29.

Albany's city charter is to be completely revised and an entire new charter submitted to the voters of the city for adoption.

By a vote of 146 to 82, the people of Lakeview defeated the \$75,000 sewer bond issue to install a sanitary method of handling the town's sewerage.

Congressman Hawley has been advised that the claim for \$3500 in favor of R. H. Henry of Klamath Falls has been allowed by the Indian bureau.

Congressman Hawley has been advised that Daniel Harris of Sheridan has been granted a pension of \$30 a month on account of service in the Mexican war.

The campaign in behalf of President Taft and the republican presidential electors in Oregon will not be started until late in August or early in September.

A restraining order, to prevent further work on the new Klamath county courthouse until the matter can be tried in the supreme court, was asked for this week.

Petitions are being circulated at Grants Pass for the recall of Mayor R. G. Smith. The petition alleges that he employed incompetent officers and paid excessive salaries.

James E. Sawhill of Bend, secretary of the Central Oregon development league, has prepared a tentative program for the convention of the league in Lakeview, August 20-25.

H. K. Donnelly and Ray Luper, two employees in the state engineer's office, are in eastern Oregon to complete the maps and gather more water supply data in water adjudication cases.

Water has been turned into the Portland Railway, Light & Power company's new reservoir on Bull Run which, when completed, will make available 30,000 horse power additional energy.

The Roseburg water and lighting systems and the real property owned in conjunction therewith have been purchased by A. Welch and his associates. A trust deed to secure a bond issue of \$400,000 has been filed.

In an effort to secure manufacturing for Medford, a new light and power water, free office, for local business men. The sites will be donated outright and tax exemption is promised for a term of years.

The supreme court of Oregon has reversed the Marion county circuit court in the University of Oregon referendum case and dismissed the suits. This means that the referendum against the appropriations of over \$400,000 will go on the ballot.

Miss Molly V. Gaither has been appointed principal of the Indian school at Chemawa. For several years Miss Gaither has been an instructor at Carlisle. Prior to that she was for nine years superintendent of the Indian school on the Umatilla reservation.

In addition to the 200,000,000 feet of timber already owned, the Wendling-Johnson Lumber company has just filed deeds at Eugene for 3700 acres of timber lands on the Blueish river, bearing timber estimated at 150,000,000 feet. The price paid was \$150,000.

Keen rivalry over the passage or failure of initiative and referendum measures is shown by the great number of affirmative and negative arguments which have been submitted to be printed in the voters' pamphlet, which will be issued prior to the November election. There are 15 affirmative arguments and 20 negative arguments.

The Jones-Wheeler company of Portland has deeded all its timber holdings in Clatsop county to the Central Trust company of Illinois and William T. Abbott, to be held in trust as security for \$300,000 in 6 per cent bonds, the money to be used to liquidate the company's outstanding obligations, and to purchase additional property.

That the delegates to the Bull Moose third party convention in Chicago, attending from Oregon, will not be entitled to receive payment of expenses from the state unless that party files a petition containing the names of at least 5 per cent of the electors at the last preceding election is taken by Secretary Olcott to be the interpretation of the law.

From the eloquence of Robert L. Mooney, ex-convict, and 18-year-old Ethel Metcalf, from Oakland to Astoria last month, has resulted an indictment by the grand jury charging Mooney with obtaining money under false pretenses. The charge is based on Mooney's action in seducing the girl's employer, Mrs. Carrie Settle, out of \$44 the day before he decamped from Oakland with Miss Metcalf.

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Political News Bits

William Look, Jr., collector of customs for the port of New York, states he has no intention of resigning his office to take part in the third party movement.

Governor Thomas R. Marshall of Indiana will be officially notified of his nomination on the democratic ticket for the vice presidency in Indianapolis, on August 17.

Former United States Senator Albert J. Beveridge has been selected for temporary chairman of the Roosevelt convention to be held in Chicago the first week in August.

Prediction that a southern progressive would be nominated for the vice presidency by the "bull moose" convention, was made in Chicago by Senator Joseph M. Dixon of Montana, manager of Colonel Roosevelt's campaign forces.

Colonel Roosevelt has finished his declaration of principles for delivery at the third party convention at Chicago, August 2. Two of the more striking measures favored by Colonel Roosevelt are the fixing by law of minimum wage scales for women workers and a guarantee by law to workmen employed in what he calls the "continuous industries" of eight hour shifts and one day's rest in every seven.

First Letter Carriers.

It is not clear that the letter carriers were regularly employed before 1793, when tradition tells us that Benjamin Franklin, the new postmaster general, employed them in Philadelphia and possibly in New York. The earliest evidence we have is of 1792, when the Philadelphia postmaster advertised that his "boys" had run away and that patrons must call for their letters at the postoffice. The Postal Journal of Hugh Finlay tells us that Boston had no letter carriers in 1773. Of New York he says that "soon after the arrival of a mail the letters are quickly delivered by a runner," which means messenger or letter carrier.
